DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Mount Belknap Grange building is a 2-1/2 story clapboarded structure with a gable roof and a low stone foundation, standing at the intersection of two roads within the Gilford Village Historic District. Attached to the north elevation of the main structure is a wooden gable-roofed wing which is 2-1/2 stories high at its intersection with the main building and 1-1/2 stories high at its northern The west gable end of the main building, facing Belknap Mountain Road, is treated as the facade. It has two doors and two store windows on the first floor beneath a porch roof (the door on the left opening onto a stairway to the second floor), three symmetrically placed windows on the second story, and a single window in the attic. The southern (side) elevation, facing Potter Hill Road, has two windows on the first floor and three above. The east (rear) elevation has two windows on each floor, offset toward the south to accommodate a stairhall which rises inside the north wall of the building; there is a single attic window in the gable. The exterior detailing of the main building is characteristic of the Greek Revival style. Corner boards are widened and provided with moulded capitals to form pilasters. The sides of the building have deep wooden entablatures above the pilasters, while the gable ends have wide frieze boards beneath boldly projecting raking cornices. Window sash (except for the two large 2/2 store windows) are 6/6 and have square-edged casings and slightly projecting ovolo caps. A single-flue brick chimney rises through the ridge near the east (rear) wall of the building.

The 2-1/2 story wing assumed its present form in 1928 and was designed to harmonize with the style of the main building, having square-edged window casings, 6/6 sash, and a strongly projecting cornice. The 1-1/2 story extension of the wing has simpler detailing, yet is coherent with the other portions of the structure.

Original Appearance: Except for such minor changes as the addition of the porch roof (which appears to date from the late nineteenth century), the Mount Belknap Grange building seems to have retained its original appearance until after 1909. Grange records indicate that in that year, when the Grange purchased the structure from John B. Morrill, son of the builder, the lower floor of the building remained a store, the second floor was an open storeroom, and the wing on the north was a one-story wood shed and horse shed. A photograph of the structure in this condition was published in the Granite Monthly magazine in 1898. After purchasing the building, the Grange divided the first floor into two rooms, using the front as a dining room and the back as a kitchen. In 1916, they installed a furnace in the back room. In 1928 the north wing was enlarged to two stories to provide new kitchen space on the first floor and an anteroom and regalia room above. At the same time the furnace was moved to the building's cellar and the dining room and kitchen were again made into a single room.

In the early 1950s the one-story wing at the far north was converted from a shed into a room for the Junior Grange, the kitchen was modernized, a fire escape was provided from the second-fllor anteroom, and all exterior doors were rehung to open outward.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Mount Belknap Grange building is a well-preserved example of a mid-nineteenth century country store with good Greek Revival detailing. As store and post office, and later as Grange hall, the building has played an important role in the life of a typical small New Hampshire village.

Architecture: The Mount Belknap Grange building is a well-preserved example of a rural commercial structure in the Greek Revival style. It is contemporary with many of the nearby structures of the small village of Gilford, and its architectural features relate closely to those of many of its neighbors.

Commerce: The Mount Belknap Grange building was constructed in the late 1850s as a store. According to the unpublished reminiscences of Alvah Folsom Hunter of Gilford,

about 1857 or '58 a third store building was erected in the village, on the edge of the millyard and directly opposite Mr. Munsey's store; it was built by Mr. [John J.] Morrill for a Levi B. Thompson & Son, who had been keeping a general store in Topsham, Maine, but being New Hampshire men they longed to get back to New Hampshire. This store never became very popular and wasn't profitable from the start,—it was discontinued soon after the close of the Civil War and the remaining stock auctioned off. The building is now [1926] owned and occupied by the local Grange. 1

Although the building had a short history as a store, it retained its original form throughout the nineteenth century and later served for many years as the Gilford post office.

Bolduc writes, "Benjamin Weeks' emporium was in the present-day Grange Hall and when he went out of business, his stock was auctioned. Later, Levi Thompson had a market at the same site."
