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White clapboard, three-storied plantation house built about 1835. Typical South Carolina adaptation of Greek Revival, with white-columned, two-storied piazza covering the main windows of the house front. In addition there are side wings; a doctor's "shop" in the right wing, the plantation office in the left.

The mansion has 14 rooms. Its great sills were hand-hewn. The inside woodwork was hand carved with high wainscoting and tall windows. The downstairs mantels are detailed with sunbursts. A partition divided the upstairs into two separate parts. Finely detailed twin staircases led to each side.

Few alterations have been made. These include addition of a gable to the main roof. The house was renovated about 1940.

Under direction of the first owner's wife, a large garden for flowers was laid out in a formal design, all the beds edged with boxwood. The walks were all graveled (burnt rock beat with sledge hammers into gravel).

An expanse of green lawn, bordered at the road with a mock orange hedge sloped down to the spring on the northern side. The Negro cabins stretched in long rows from the southern side of the "big house," toward another spring at the foot of the slope. The grounds were noted for their beauty and neatness. (It is said that the small Negroes went throughout the yard every morning during rose-blooming time to pick wind-blown petals from the walks).

The original English boxwood and the tree box have grown into a formal garden noted today for its exceptional beauty. Some of the pecan trees that tower over the house measure more than three feet in diameter.


STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Historical significance of the name Camp Hill stems from earlier use of the hill-top location as a Revolutionary War campsite by Col. Patrick Ferguson and his Tories prior to the Battle of Kings Mountain. The entire area figured prominently in Revolutionary maneuvers, and Banastre Tarleton's name is also associated with its history. In the nearby family cemetery (beginning with the Wofford family), an inscription reading "1776" is embedded in the stop step.

From the added standpoint of architecture and landscape architecture, Camp Hill is a beautiful and well-preserved example of the Piedmont's antebellum plantation era, valuable also in reflecting the increasing affluence of the planter period as elaborate homes replaced the crude log cabins of the early-settler Wofford and West families.

Of added significance is the Camp Hill location near Glenn Springs, at one time one of the state's wealthiest areas and noted as a mineral-springs resort.

The Camp Hill land was first acquired by the present family around 1830 when Dr. Winn Smith bought more than a thousand acres, beginning in 1832 to build "a large and stately house on top of the very hill where Ferguson had made his camp so many years before." This information comes from an article in the Spartanburg Herald-Journal by Mrs. S.T.D. Lancaster, a sister of Dr. Clifton Smith. Dr. Smith lived in the mansion from 1881 until his death in 1967. He was an Army Medical Corps Captain in 1917, stationed in South America and Puerto Rico, and Doctor of the Year in 1961.
