	The Oak Grove Methodist Church, built ca. 1890, is a rectangular shaped frame building with a weatherboarded exterior, concrete block foundation, and metal gable roof. A small frame addition, ca. 1965, is attached to the rear of the church. The facade (south elevation) of the church is 3 bays wide. The central bay is an enclosed gabled entrance porch with a double leaf panelled door and a lancet arched transom with y-tracery. A belltower with bellcast pyramidal roof covered with shakes surmounts the entrance porch. The belltower has louvered rectangular openings on all four sides, a circular opening in front, and is topped by a finial. To each side of the entrance is a lancet window with y-tracery. The church is 3 bays deep with lancet windows like those of the facade on both the east and west elevation. The lancet windows, entrance, and belltower of the church reflect a Gothic Revival influence.		
The Oak grove Methodist Church, built ca. 1890, is one of the best preserved, least altered of Meigs County's rural churches. Located in the community of Peakland, the church is one of the few buildings still standing in the settlement Brinkley Hornsby attempted to develop as a town ca. 1820 as an experiment in land speculation. The Oak Grove Methodist Church is an excellent example of the type of church built by a small but prosperous rural congregation. Furthermore, it is the only example of Victorian Gothic period ecclesiatical architecture in the county. Although religious structures are ordinarily not considered eligible for the National Register, the primary significance of the Oak Grove Methodist Church is architecture, thereby
