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The Chapel, built from 1875 to 1877, is also in the High Victorian Gothic style. Its designer, D. A. Bohlen, was also an Indianapolis architect, of German birth and education. In 1917 D. A. Bohlen & Son were the architects chosen to add the apse to the Chapel.

The graves themselves are of great significance both to the cemetery and to Indianapolis, for many historically important people are buried there. At the level of national importance is the grave of President Benjamin Harrison, and the graves of three Vice-Presidents. In addition, after 1864 when the cemetery was dedicated, it found itself considered the most fashionable burying ground in the community, and graves of most of the prominent people of Indianapolis are found there. A small portion of Crown Hill Cemetery is also a United States National Military Cemetery, established in 1866, and containing some seven hundred graves of soldiers of the Civil War and of subsequent wars, and of one drummer boy who died in the American Revolution.

The hill is crowned by a memorial to the poet James Whitcomb Riley.
