DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Absalom Scales House is an unusual double-fronted country house near Eagleville. It extends seven bays in width with the five bays to the right forming a typical Classical Revival Tennessee home with a projecting two-story gabled wooden portico supported on piers on the third bay of the front facade. The pair of left bays are separated by a short wall section from the unit of five and comprise on the front a second facade with a triangular pedimented doorway on the right side. The entire front is unified by common window sizes, a tall six-over-six on the ground floor and a short six-over six on the second. Each of the windows is shuttered.

The house is three bays deep with the central bay on each end occupied by a projecting stone chimney. The right-hand chimney is intact while the upper portion of the left chimney has been replaced with brick above the upper fireplace. The complete chimney is handsomely quoined in rough-hewn stone and banded with a double cornice at the top. It matches the third chimney which projects between the third and fourth bays from the right.

On the rear facade the two-bay unit is surfaced in clapboard which also covers one bay of the end of the building, while the entire five bay section is of brick. A single-story frame ell projects beyond the wooden section of the rear facade. A wooden portico supported on simple Classical Revival piers of single-story height is appended to the three central bays.

The entire structure rests on a stone water-table of two rough-hewn courses. Simple sills and beams occur above and below each window. The front portico gives access to the structure through a handsome wide Greek Revival doorway with typical "ears" and side-lights. The leaf of the door is four-panelled. There is no upper transom. Simple wooden cornices mark the eave lines and all gables including that of the front portico. The roof has a single ridge height, parallel to the front facade, and gabled ends. It is covered in shingle.

It is said that underneath the Greek Revival brickwork and trim is the skeleton of yellow poplar of the original smaller house of the late 18th century. This is quite possibly the two-bay unit on the left of the front facade.

7. <u>DESCRIPTION</u> (cont.)

Around 1790, Absalom Scales erected a four-room frame house of yellow poplar on his 600 acres of rolling land. The walls were Wainscoted and the floors were of wide poplar planks. A small stairway led to two bedrooms. Soon after Scales' death in 1835, the property came into the possession of his son, Noah. It was he who enlarged the house, covering the entire structure with brick. He built another entrance with a two story portico. This entrance led to a hallway with oval walls.

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8. <u>SIGNIFICANCE</u> (cont.)

Family records reveal that Absalom Scales, born in North Carolina on December 3, 1769, came to Tennessee at an early age. Deeds and tax records show that he was living at this site in the 1790's, indicating that the early part of the house was built around 1790. The addition was built around 1840, at which time the original frame portion was bricked. It is a significant example of the evolution from a simple house of an early settler in the late 18th century to a larger house reflecting the Greek Revival architecture of the period, as the family grew and prospered in the mid-nineteenth century.
