DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Weston Observatory stands atop Oak Hill which, in turn, is located within Derryfield Park. This is an extremely large park encompassing many acres of grass lawns, wooded areas and a ski slope for the use of city residents. Oak Hill is by far the best vantage point for viewing the panorama of the city and the lands beyond the Merrimack River and on to the distant mountains. From this point the city appears to be laid at the viewer's feet and it is for this reason that this location was chosen for the observatory tower.

The Weston Observatory is a five story, eight sided tower constructed of gray granite set in an irregular uncoursed Its walls taper slightly inward above the heavy pattern. cornice at the top of the first story. An entrance on the West side is topped with a smooth granite lintely reading WESTON and gives access to the interior spiral iron stairway which leads to the roofed open observation platform at the top of the tower. The platform is railed on all sides and its roof, supported by eight slim metal posts, is topped by an eight sided small cupola. Rectangular windows with slightly projecting granite sills are found in tiers of three on every other side, their levels reflecting the rising stair inside. Massive stone blocks, one to a side, finish the tower's base. The top beneath the observation platform is finished with a moulded cornice above a plain frieze. This is sheathed in copper as is the matching but smaller cornice beneath the platform's roof, the cupola and the roof itself.

With the exception of its highly deteriorated and almost ruinous condition, the tower stands today largely as when it was built in 1897. The double hung two pane sashes have disappeared from the windows together with their wooden frames. The original wooden door with its four panes of glass at the top is also missing and the relief map identifying the terrain seen from the observatory is no longer in place on the observation platform. The fabric of the building has deteriorated perhaps beyond repair. Large chunks of granite have fallen from the exterior. Weather has gotten in between the exterior granite and the interior brick wall causing damage to both and changes in the rubble fill between. The lower section of the stairway is missing, the glass is gone from the cupola and large sections of the copper sheathing have been torn away.

At the present time the observatory is surrounded by a high wire fence in an attempt to keep out the young vandals who have done so much damage to the structure. The area around the building is now much overgrown and difficult to police and the vandals continue to gain access despite the various preventive measures taken to keep them out.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

#### Architecture

The Weston Observatory is a unique and handsome structure for the city of Manchester. Its location atop Oak Hill makes it a landmark seen for miles around and its strong simple design makes it a noteworthy structure in its own right. The building was designed by the Lowell, Mass. firm of Davis and Raynes and the building contract given to Head and Dowst, a prominent Manchester firm. The corner stone was laid by the New Hampshire State Grand Lodge A.F. and A.M. on September 7, 1896 during the semi-centennial celebration of the city of Manchester. The structure was dedicated and opened to the public with great fanfare on September 6, 1897.

The tower is built of granite from the Bailey quarry in Allenstown. The floor of the outlook is 50 feet from the ground, the outlook is 16 feet high and the total height of the structure is 66 feet from base to roof peak. At the time of its construction local newspapers proudly stated that it was so well constructed that it would stand for centuries an unblemished monument to its builder.

#### Political

The Observatory was built by the city of Manchester with \$5,000 left to it for that purpose by ex-Governor James A. Weston at that time New Hampshire's only Governor from Manchester who was also a native born resident of that city. Governor Weston served two terms as Governor of the state and four as Mayor of the city of Manchester. He was a well known civil engineer having laid out a considerable portion of the track for the Concord Railroad and the Concord & Portsmouth Railroad. He was also known for his part in the design and construction of the water works for the cities of both Concord and Manchester and for his 1870 map of the city of Manchester.

Gov. We ston and his family resided in a house at the corner of Myrtle and Maple streets in Manchester. The site is now occupied by a privately endowed park established by a later resident. The observatory is therefore the only structure continued on continuation sheet 1



presently standing in Manchester which is strongly connected with this important state and local personage.

### Recreation

The Weston Observatory was originally kept open to the public during the summer months and was a popular focal point for city residents who enjoyed viewing the city and the state beyond from this high vantage point. Governor Weston stated in his will that his purpose in leaving this bequest to the city was "for the advancement of science, for educational, purposes, and for the pleasure, enjoyment, benefit and mental improvement of the inhabitants of Manchester and for the people who may visit Manchester." The observatory served these purposes admirably up until the time of the Sicond World War. The tower is a symbol of a more leisurely time when people found their recreation close to home and a walk or drive to a high vantage point was considered a pleasant afternoon's occupation. It was the place to take visitors and show them the young city of which the residents were so proud, and perhaps was also the magnet for young couples, es the hill was for evening "parkers" until the road to the summit was closed a few years ago.

During WW II the observatory was used as an airplane spotting post and after the war as a broadcasting tower for the police department. Due to these activities public use was discontinued and the city never again opened the structure to the public for recreational purposes. The observatory's present state of near ruin is directly due to this action and to the total lack of maintenance by the city.
