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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The is a nine story, brick commercial structure located in Central Stockton, at the corner of San Joaquin and Main Streets. The first story and mezzanine levels are faced in granite. This arcaded and rusticated section of the building is very massive in scale and size. Five segmented arches span the San Joaquin Street facade; the southern-most arch opens into the lobby. Massive pilasters of segmented granite separate the arches, with larger pilasters anchoring the corners of the building.

The structure, overall, is segmented horizontally into zones or bands. A richly decorated frieze at the upper part of the rusticated band composed of the first story and mezzanine, includes medallions within the metopes separating trigletys. A band of dentils surmounts the frieze panels which is immediately below a small moulded coursing of masonry. The second story level has five pairs of double-hung windows which are separated by six bas-relief panels. These panels have an urn and garland pattern. Above these windows is a smaller decorated frieze with a smaller coursing above.

The third through ninth stories are of simple masonry construction, pierced by five pairs of wooden framed double-hung windows. There is a masonry pattern delineating hoods over the windows. Plain horizontal concrete lugsills are under each individual window. Above the ninth story windows is a highly enriched frieze with six pairs of garlands and stylized foliage, spaced by rectangular grates. Two rows of dentils are immediately above this pattern. Projecting eaves are bracketed, and form the concluding statement of this large and impressive structure, helping to weigh the building earthward.

The North side of the facade, fronting Main Street, includes the same detailing except that the building contains sets of three features, while the larger expanse of the Eastern elevation contains five features. Thus, the Main Street elevation has three rusticated, segmented arches, and three pairs of double-hung windows on the third through the ninth floors. The Western facade has a sign painted on the upper stories, now quite faded, identifying this as the California Building. An additional alteration to the original character of this building is the addition of a large fire escape on the Eastern facade.

This building contains many elements reminiscent of the style of architecture designed by Louis Sullivan of the Chicago School. The structure is clearly a reflection of the new technologies developed during this period, and yet, is still an expression of the Second Renaissance Revival period which was popular both before and during this time. No major alterations of the exterior of this building have been perpetrated during the course of this structure's existence. See the Significance Section for further information on the architect and historical background of this structure.

The Farmer's and Merchant's Building occupies all of a slightly irregularly-shaped lot approximately 51 feet by 87 feet, as described in detail in Item 10 of this application.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Farmer's and Merchant's Bank

The was designed by George W. Kelham (1871-1936), a prominent architect from San Francisco. Kelham also designed that city's public library, completed in 1917, as well as the St. Francis Hotel. Both buildings clearly reflect Kelham's classical training both at Harvard and the Paris Ecole des Beaux Arts. Kelham was also the supervising architect for the University of California at Los Angeles campus in 1922, designing the Library, Royce Hall, the Chemistry building and the Education building. Kelham was commissioned to design a new structure to house the Farmer's and Merchant's Bank in 1916.

The Bank was founded in Stockton in October of 1888. On January 1, 1916, Frank A. Guernsey succeeded his father, D.A. Guernsey, as president of the bank. It was at that time that it was decided that the bank should have new quarters at the Southwest corner of Main and San Joaquin Streets. The opening ceremonies for the new Farmer's and Merchant's bank building were held on September 1, 1917. The Stockton Record reported:

The City of Stockton is happy today in welcoming the new Farmer's and Merchant's Bank building as a permanent fixture. It is a structure that can be pointed to with pride by citizens when showing strangers or visitors some of the excellent features we possess as a city.

The interior was described in this article as being very opulent. Entrance was gained through a pair of heavy bronze doors. The bank screen was hand carved of Eastern Oak by the French artist Laroulandie. The center lobby area had Tennessee marble floors. A long, curved oak check table was in the center of this public space. The walls and pillars were of Travertine marble from the Tiber River region, near Rome, the same as was used inside the Vatican and the San Francisco Public Library.

Electroliers of carved bronze with frosted globes were suspended from the ceiling.

The bank vault door was eight inches thick and weighed five tons. The safe deposit boxes were housed in the basement, reached by a flight of marble stairs. The ladies restroom nearby was equipped with writing paper, and a telephone. The mezzanine level contained the director's office which was panelled with oak from floor to ceiling.

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Significance (cont.):

The Farmer's and Merchant's Bank was known as the "Bank of Good Service". The bank was replaced by the David A. Levinson's women's apparel shop in 1941, which is still the first floor tenant.

[Merchant's Bank]

The Farmer's and is a handsome example of the Second Renaissance Revival style of architecture, with the strong influence of Louis Sullivan. Regimented zones, beginning with an arcaded and rusticated ground level, and extending to more sophisticated upper floors are all part of Sullivan's architectural style. Sullivan's influence is apparent in the stylized foliage and highly enriched frieze areas at all levels of the building's exterior. Furthermore, the structure is a handsome example of the movement of "modern" skyscrapers which were built in Stockton during this period when Stockton became known as "the brick city".

The California Building has been designated as a local historic resource by the Stockton City Council in a resolution dated 2 April 1979. This action was taken on behalf of the local heritage group in Stockton represented by Mr. Ray Hillman.

The Farmer's and Merchant's Bank is significant for its architectural merit, retaining a high degree of integrity and being associated with a noted California architect. The structure is significant as well for its contribution to the commercial development of the local community, housing a prominent, locally-owned bank for nearly a quarter-century.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION

All of lots 1,3, and 5 and the west 10% inches of the north 90 feet of lot 7, all of lot 13 except the southerly 1 3/4 inches, all in block 13 east of Sutter Street.

Beginning at the intersection of the southerly line of Main Street and the westerly line of San Joaquin Street, proceed south 80.88 feet along said line of San Joaquin Street, then at right angles west 18.21 feet, south 5.82 feet, west 32.97 feet, north 86.7 feet, and east 51.18 feet along said line of Main Street to point of beginning.


