DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The substantial, two-story frame house with clapboard siding built in 1888 for dairy farmer George F. Moeck has been a highly visible landmark since the Columbia River Highway was opened to traffic in 1915, and long before that the house could be seen from steamboats plying the Columbia.

Irregular in plan, the gable-roofed house is oriented northeasterly to southwesterly, with its main entrance offset to one side of the fore wing end. The latter faces the Columbia River to the northeast. Closely paralleling the south bank of the river, the Spokane-Portland and Seattle Railroad tracks and U.S. Highway 30 are gathered into a narrow corridor between the house and the river. Finished simply with details (such as corner boards and frieze boards) derived from the Classical Revival, the one-time farmhouse and boarding house is situated above road grade on the toe of a wooded hillside. Portions of the latter, rising to the southeast, have been subdivided for residential development in recent years.

The building's fenestration is regular for the most part. Original window openings are fitted with double hung sash having two lights over two. Shutters appear on windows of the front elevation and those in the end of the southeast wing. A brick stove chimney with corbelled cap straddles the roof ridge of each of the three wings of the house. The seven-foot-high stone masonry basement with beamed ceiling is believed to have been added 1909-1911. A porch deck with railing extends across the front elevation. In the right angle formed by the southeasterly and southwesterly wings is a sheltered side porch with stairs and railing. The outer face of the southwesterly wing was altered by the addition of two formally-placed dormers during the 1930s when the house was subdivided as a four-plex.

Current owners acquired the property in 1977 and have removed partitions of the 1930s, reopened stairways and rehabilitated most of the fourteen rooms as part of a plan to reclaim the house for low-key commercial purposes. Together, the first and second stories provide some 2500 square feet of floor space. A wine and cheese shop is slated for installation in the basement. The main floor is being developed as a restaurant, and the second story is to be used as a ladies' boutique and art gallery. A fifty-car parking area has been prepared on the southeasterly side of the house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The large framehouse of George F. Moeck in Rainier commands a view of the Columbia River and Mount Rainier in Washington State beyond to the northeast. It is significant as the externally intact house of a prominent local figure, the proprietor of Moeck's Addition to Rainier. It is the only remaining element of a once thriving enterprise which Moeck operated at the place. In addition to his farm and house--a boarding place for travelers--Moeck maintained a dock and general store on the river front.

The town of Rainier was founded by Charles Fox as early as 1851. It was one of several communities established as shipping points along the south bank of the Columbia River at an early date. A comparative newcomer, George F. Moeck arrived on the scene in 1871 or 1872. Born in Wurtemburg in 1837, he emigrated to America in 1854 and settled in Summit County, Ohio. From Ohio, young Moeck moved West to Missouri and thence to the gold fields of Colorado and Montana. In 1871 he gave up mining and came to Oregon. Upon his arrival in Rainier he worked in one of the many sawmills of the district. He married Margaret Gilbreath in 1873 and amassed a homestead of some 450 acres adjoining the Rainier townsite. Moeck developed a dairy farm on his holdings and, in 1892, laid out upon a portion thereof Moeck's Addition.

The subject house, built in 1888, accommodated Moeck's sizable family of six children and, it is understood, steamboat passengers and sailors in need of lodgings. Taking advantage of his river frontage, Moeck had early developed a boat dock and a general store. He is reported to have brought cord wood from the wooded levels of his acreage down to the dock by flume. The wood, of course, was sold to replenish fuel supplies of the steam vessels. A long-time and respected member of his community, Moeck twice served as Mayor of Rainier.
