Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

This one-and-one-half story, four-by-four bay, asymmetrical Queen Anne, clapboard house rests on brick piers. Its complex roofline is created by a steep hip roof pierced by gables. Originally, the roof was sheathed in wooden shakes which are now covered by diamond-shaped asbestos shingles.

The wraparound, front porch features a wooden balustrade and delicately turned posts. Brackets of scrollwork and other scrollwork features hang below the fascia board of the porch. Above the entrance located in the porch area, a gable with a sunburst motif pierces the porch roof. This front entrance is capped by a transom and flanked by sidelights. Another entrance located in the side area of the wraparound porch has a door with no sidelights topped by a simple transom.

There are a variety of window forms. These include a one over one double hung sash window with the upper pane bordered in art glass on the west facade's three-sided bay. The front gable has diagonal tongue-and-groove beaded board and an elaborate, three-dimensional sunburst motif. The side gables are much simpler in design with scrollwork in their peaks and panelling along the bottoms. The small four-over-four double hung sash windows in the gables are ca. 1920 alterations.

Original interior elements include hardwood flooring, tongue-and-groove beaded board panelling and decorative door frames with bull's eye corners. The oak mantles remain, although some have been enclosed behind new walls.

Other alterations, in addition to those previously mentioned, are enlarging and enclosing the rear porch and adding a rear dormer to the main roof (ca. 1940 or earlier); replacing the front porch steps with concrete steps (ca. 1950) and applying metal roofing to one section of the porch roof. These minor alterations do not compromise the architectural integrity of the building.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This house is one of the best examples of the Queen Anne style of architecture in Biloxi. It features a wraparound front porch, irregular floor plan, steeply pitched hip roof pierced by gables and a profusion of ornamentation - all typical architectural elements of the Queen Anne style. The ornamentation includes turned posts and spindles on the porch, scrollwork, the sunburst motif and tongue-and-groove beaded board panelling (Julia Cook Guice, et al., The Buildings of Biloxi: An Architectural Survey [Biloxi: 1976], p. 71).

Along with this exceptional detailing, the house enjoys an unusually high quality level of construction for structures built during this time period in the Biloxi area. It is believed to have been constructed by Vincent Bass, a local builder who may have also built the adjacent house at 413 E. Howard Street. It is known that Bass acquired the property in 1894 and owned it until at least 1904 and that the house at 407 E. Howard was built prior to the latter date (Deborah Gill, current owner, telephone interview by Susan M. Enzweiler, architectural historian with the Mississippi Department of Archives and History, Jackson, May 5, 1986).

The Gulf Coast was plagued by a number of hurricanes from the early 1890s up to 1906. A fire in Biloxi on November 9, 1900 also destroyed over eighty buildings in that town. Demolitions and unsympathetic alterations of Biloxi's turn-of-the-century structures have also helped to deplete the number of significant buildings from that period. Consequently, although these years saw a steady advance in population and industrial growth, there are fewer resources from this period than one might expect. This fact gives additional significance to the remaining properties (Guice, pp. 16-17).

The property at 407 E. Howard Street is not a part of any present or potential historic district. The only other historically and/or architecturally significant houses on the block are 413 and 440 E. Howard Street. The former was constructed about the same time as #407 and the latter dates from circa 1905. However, this block is dominated by a small shopping center, mid-twentieth century houses and earlier residences which have lost their integrity.
