L. DESCRIPTIC	ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION AND PRESENT CONDITION: Victorian-Commercial, two story brick and iron building. Brick laid in common bond. First floor is divided into four bays by five cast iron columns, all of them square. The three center ones have Corinthian capitals, the two outer ones have no detail work, but support large metal brackets which define ends of the facade, and hold a pressed metal frieze and cornice. The first floor is intact although the spaces between the columns have been modernized. Second floor is three bays wide, with three 2/2 sash windows, the sills of the windows are defined by a string course of corbelled brick, the lintel of the windows are cast iron, brackets on the sides of the windows visually support (cont.) on back

	HISTORICAL NARRATIVE (FROM ORIGINS TO PRESENT): This is apparently the same building that's represented in the drawn-to-scale sketches on the Sanborn (Insurance) Maps of 1889 and 1895. On the 1889 map, the building is labeled "auction" house. However, by 1894, the address was that of the "Western Union Telegraph Co." The telegraph company maintained its office here, continuously, until 1927. The "Dixie Cafe" move to this address in 1927, after the departure of "Western Union." In the city directory of 1896-1897, there are listings for two attorneys-at-law (Herschel V. Hargett and James M. Lennard), merchandise brokers ("Hoopes and Matthews") and offices of Mutual Reserve Fund Life Assoc., ("Malone and Pinkston")all at 1007½ Broad. Various attorneys and insurance agencies maintained offices on the second floor of this (cont

	STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): Local History: This building is significant as it apparently served as an early auction house, which later become a local office of "Western Union Telegraph Co." "Western Union" remained at this address for nearly 35 years. Also significant is the fact that $1007\frac{1}{2}$ was the address of various local attorneys and insurance agents during the late 1890's and early 1900's. <u>Architecture</u> : This building is one of the finest, best proportioned Victorian Commercial structures in Columbus. There is a sense of balance displayed between the four bay 1st floor and the three bay 2nd floor. The cast iron lintels are very rare in Columbus.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION- a flat cornice with a center rounded arch, these cornices are decorated with fluting and acanthus leaves. Above each window is a rectangular cast iron vent. The parapet of the building has a pressed metal frieze and a cornice with modillions. Two large pressed metal brackets, one at either end, support the frieze and cornice, and define the ends of the building, similar to the smaller end brackets on the first floor.
