DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

About ten blocks west of Hartford's central business district is Woodland Street. A fairly busy street, it is bordered by many apartment buildings and a few old houses. On the east side of Woodland about two blocks south of Asylum Street is the old Lyman House, now used as a meeting place by the Hartford Town and County Club.

The house is elegantly situated upon a small rise and is beautifully landscaped. It is a three story, three bay Federal style building constructed with yellow bricks and embellished with quoins and keystone lintels above the windows. The center bay, also decorated with quoins, projects from the facade slightly and is surmounted by a gable with returns. Just beneath the gable, on the third floor, is a Palladian window, typical of the Federal style. A modillion and dentil cornice at roof line and under the gable, draws attention to the height of the building. Yet a projecting semicircular Doric columned porch surrounding the entry seems to accent its width, as does a slightly projecting belt course above the second floor. Six chimneys are situated on the slope sides of the hip roof, and semicircular bays stand out on the south and west elevations.

In summary, this old home has a very sturdy, blocklike appearance typical of its classical style, and, situated as it is, presents a very imposing, yet gracious, facade to Woodland Street.

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Modifications to Main Building Block

The only major alteration to the original Lyman House was undertaken in 1929-30. On October 31, 1930 a ballromm, which had been described as an "auditorium" in the architectural plans, was formally opened with an evening reception. At the time of the ballroom addition, a new and larger dining room was added where there previously was a small porch. The south windows of the original dining room were eliminated when the ballroom was added to the main structure. In 1975 a corridor connecting the kitchen and ballroom to facilitate service for large parties is being built at the rear of the house. From the exterior, it will appear as an extension of the dining room.

8. SIGNIFICANCE

The old Town and County Club on Woodland Street was built in 1895 for the lawyer, Theodore Lyman and his family in what was then the most distinguished residential area in Hartford. After Lyman's widow, Laure, died in 1924, the home was bought by the Town and County Club in 1925.

When Lyman wanted to build a house he went to the firm of Hapgood and Hapgood, an architectural partnership of cousins, Melvin Hathaway Hapgood and Edward T. Hapgood. Very little is known about Melvin except that he died in 1899. His brother, Edward, however, is known to have been connected with the planning of other buildings throughout Connecticut, such as the Manchester Hall of Records, Simsbury High School, and he also helped design the Connecticut State Building at the St. Louis Expo in 1904. Edward also worked with New York architect, Donn Barber while he was designing the State Library and Supreme Court Building (1910).

The Lyman house is an elegant example of the architectural style in vogue at the turn-of-the-century and, as such, is worthy of notice. It is in excellent condition and, in the hands of the Town and County Club, is likely to remain so.

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Biographical Information: Theodore Lyman (builder of original structure).

The following material is abstracted from Theodore Lyman's obituary, which appeared in the Hartford Courant on August 13, 1920:

Theodore Lyman was born in Hartford, January 4, 1824; was a graduate of Yale College, class of 1855; studied law and was admitted to the Bar in 1859; practiced law in Hartford for nearly 40 years. He attained a high reputation as an honorable and able exponent of law of real property. His relations at times included some of the large corporations of the city. In 1883 he succeeded his father, Christoper C. Lyman, as Director of the Hartford Fire Insurance Co. He was a vice president of Society for Savings, a major Hartford bank and was Director of Connecticut General Life Insurance Co. and Trustee of Hartford, Connecticut Trust Co. Theodore Lyman died in Hartford in August, 1920 at the age of 86.
