Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The First Baptist Church is a rectangular wooden frame building sheathed in weatherboards. Its Greek Revival style appearance featuring a pediment, corner pilasters and broad entablatures above the doors dates to 1849 when alterations were made to the original 1803-04 meeting house. The building stands upon a shallow terraced knoll framed by deciduous trees and bordered by a rail fence with granite slab posts.

The front (east) elevation of the First Baptist Church is divided into two stories each of which has a different but symmetrical fenestration pattern. A pair of widely spaced doors with sidelights, broad paneled surrounds and plain entablature occupy the first story whereas four six-oversix double-hung sash windows with wooden blinds are arranged on the second level. The entire facade is framed by paneled corner pilasters and a broad pediment. A wooden water table is located over the sill and granite slab foundation.

The north and south side elevations are punctuated by a trio of fifteenover-fifteen-over-fifteen triple-hung sash. Their plain surrounds match those employed on the front windows. they also feature wooden blinds consisting of a single long unit for the middle and lower sash and short panels for the upper sash. The cornice and water table continue along both sides and the pilasters are repeated at the corners. Two small six-over-six windows with Federal style trim are located in the gable peak at the rear.

Like the exterior, the church's interior exhibits the Greek Revival style changes made in 1849. A vestibule is located at the rear of the nave above which is a gallery reached by two sets of enclosed stairs (one of which has been closed). When first built this gallery continued along both side walls. The nave contains three principal sets of wooden pews separated by aisles as well as two smaller groups flanking the raised sanctuary. All of the pews have curvilinear armrests typical of the period. The sanctuary is composed of a projecting dias framed by stairs and containing the pulpit behind which is the organ and deacons' seating. A darkly stained balustrade with turned newels and balusters embrace the slightly elevated area behind the pulpit. The deep paneled reveals of the windows as well as all other wooden trim is finished in a dark stain. An intact turn-of-the-century pressed tin ceiling is composed of square blocks with bullseyes and a wide cornice. The walls are of plaster over lath construction.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

Originally built in 1803-04 and extensively remodeled in 1849, the First Baptist Church located at the Old Corner in Waterboro is a wooden frame building exhibiting traditional Federal period meeting house characteristics juxtaposed with Greek Revival style detailing. It is being nominated to the National Register under criterion C and criteria consideration A as a religious property with significant architectural merit.

The First Baptist Church traces its origins to an organizational meeting on October 27, 1791, held by eight members of the local community known as the Old Corner. Church records indicate that the congregation's first house of worship, a rectangular building 50'X40' in dimension, was erected in 1803-04, at a cost of about \$2,000. This building is believed to have featured galleries along three of its interior walls and a nave floor which sloped toward the high pulpit with sounding board. In 1849 this building was thoroughly remodeled to its present appearance at a cost of \$1,732. Despite the fact that a Baptist Church was organized at the turn of the century in a nearby village center, regular services were held in the building until about 1947. Since that time the church has been maintained by members of the First Baptist Church and Society and occasionally used for weddings, funerals and a yearly Grange Sunday gathering.

Clothed in Greek Revival style ornamentation which is typical of rural Maine buildings of the mid-nineteenth century, the church is nevertheless somewhat unusual because of its pronounced meeting house configuration. This combination of characteristics clearly demonstrates how the earlier meeting house was remodeled in 1849. The ability to visualize the two schemes lends this building additional significance. Although many congregations replaced or made changes to their earlier buildings, few exhibit the clear stylistic distinctions that the First Baptist Church does. For example, the Jesse Lee

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Church (N.R. 7/19/84) in Readfield began its life in 1795 as a traditional meeting house but was remodeled in 1825 and then extensively changed in 1857 so that it resembles others of the period. Thus, despite the fact that portions of its eighteenth century frame survive, the building does not exhibit the earlier appearance. This is not the case with the Baptist Church and, therefore, provides the architectural historian with an important glimpse into the process by which people adapted their early nineteenth century religious buildings to meet later popular stylistic configurations.
