DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Cedar Valley Seminary is a two story educational facility, built in 1869, which housed the seminary (private high school) until the local public school system acquired it in 1922. In 1963, the building was rented by the Mitchell County Historical Society for use as a museum.

The seminary measures 72 feet by 36feet, of red brick laid in common bond on a cement-covered stone foundation. It was stuccoed in 1922. The building is three bays wide and four deep, with a central, pedimented entrance pavilion at the front. First floor windows (of which there are nine on the south side, the extra five added in 1917), have segmental arched heads and ornamental wooden dripmolds decorated with keystones and pendants. Second floor windows are taller (6/4 lights vs. 4/4), with round heads and hoods similar to those below. The main entrance has a round-arched double door with keystone, and an oculus window beneath the gable end.

The low-pitched hip roof, covered with composition shingle, has paired brackets beneath wide eaves. A paneled frieze is outlined by a narrow strip of brick corbelling. A low, square cupola with round-headed, louvred openings and a finial, was part of the original design but now long gone.

Exterior alterations, apart from the addition of windows to the south side, appear to have been minimal, confined largely to the loss of the cupola and two brick chimneys with corbelled caps. The effect of the stucco, contrasted with the dark paint of various decorative features (window hoods, brackets, frieze line), has been to accentuate the latter elements.

The interior of the structure is simply broken into functional areas. The first floor has a central corridor through half the length of the building, with a classroom to the north and stairway, offices and storage to the south. The first floor rear contains two large classrooms, 40' x 18', from which the dividing wall was removed by the historical society in the 1960's. The upper floor contains a large chapel and recitation room, with a music room at the rear. A stage in the chapel area was removed during the public school's use of the building. Flooring throughout is 4" board, walls are plastered. No furnishings remain from the structure's use as a seminary; the whole is now equipped for the display of items related to local history.

The seminary is located in a residential area in this county-seat town. Part of the grounds are still used by the public school system as a playground for the adjoining elementary school. Two, two-story frame buildings, called East and West Halls, were associated with the Seminary during its operation, possibly as dormitory and additional instructional space. These are no longer extant.



STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

8 SIGNIFICANCE

The former Cedar Valley Seminary building is a very competent rendering of the Italianate style, its few alterations in keeping with, or highlighting, the basic design. It is also significant as a private educational institution, founded in 1862, which for 80 years offered extensive and high quality upper-level instruction to students in northern Iowa.

Cedar Valley Seminary was the result of a joint effort by the inhabitants of Osage, Iowa, and the Cedar Valley Baptist Association, headquartered in Waterloo, to create a quality educational institution for young people in the Osage area. In September, 1862, Osage citizens offered to "furnish suitable buildings, if the (Baptist) association would establish and maintain an institution of learning suited to the wants of the community".¹ The Cedar Valley Baptist Association accepted this offer; in January, 1863, Alva Bush, former mathematics professor at Upper Iowa University (Fayette), held the first classes of the school, "consisting of 17 gentlemen and 14 ladies".²

Not until 1869, however, did Cedar Valley Seminary have a building of its own. During the first six years, the school (and Professor Bush) were housed in the county courthouse at Osage, built in 1858-60 but, due to county politics, not occupied by local government until 1870. Lack of a permanent home for the Seminary, however, had no effect upon its enrollment. There were 106 students from January, 1863 to June, 1864, 146 during the 1865-66 term, and numbers remained relatively consistent throughout the decade.

In September, 1869, the new, two-story seminary building was offered to the Cedar Valley Baptist Association, on condition that the association raise a \$20,000 endowment to maintain the school. The first class in the new structure had 75 men and 93 women, partaking in a curriculum "specifically adapted to meet the present wants in the line of education".³ It was an extremely practical curriculum, beginning realistically, with a "preparatory year" designed to assist students from widely varying elementary-school backgrounds to hone basic skills in "the common branches" (reading, arithmetic, writing) as a first step toward the following, advanced "courses" of study. These "courses", or "majors", in 20th century parlance, were five: teachers' business, science, literary (mostly Latin) and classical (emphasizing Greek). The courses ranged from one to four years' duration, science being the longest (it included "all the leading sciences", a class in history, another in English literature, and a year or more of German).

Although owned and maintained by the Baptists, Cedar Valley Seminary was essentially non-sectarian throughout its existence, oriented less toward the propagation of a particular creed and far more toward high quality education for students of all religious persuasions. The success of the curriculum, originally designed by Alva Bush and enlarged and refined under his successors, was indicated by the number of graduates who went on to a variety of successful careers as adults. Chief among them was author Hamlin Garland (graduated 1881); a roster of alumnae from 1871 to 1905 is liberally sprinkled with doctors, ministers, and professors; other occupations are not listed.⁴

Cedar Valley Seminary closed in 1922, the building acquired by the Osage Public School system. It was rented to the Mitchell County Historical Society in the 1960's, after a county referendum halted its proposed demolition.

EXPLANATION OF THE AMENDMENT

The Osage School Community School District owned the Cedar Valley Seminary from 1922-2015. In 2015, the Board decided to build an addition to the existing elementary school on the same site as the Seminary building. The architectural plans called for removal or demolition of the Cedar Valley Seminary building. The building was offered to interested parties to salvage and demolish or move off site. In November of 2015, the Osage Community School District sold the Cedar Valley Seminary Foundation.

Historically, the Cedar Valley Seminary encompassed an entire city block within a residential neighborhood. The extant building, known as "Old Central," was the first building completed in 1869 for the seminary and is the only building that remains standing in 2015. There were also both men's and women's residence halls and a gymnasium, but over time the other buildings were demolished. The front of the extant Seminary building could be seen when looking west on Mechanic Street. When the Cedar Valley Seminary (Junior College) closed in 1922, all buildings on campus were given to the Osage School District. Over the years, the other buildings were demolished and replaced with either open space or a new structure. East of the campus, housing was replaced with a grocery store and parking lot.

The proposed location for the Cedar Valley Seminary building is one block east and just south of the Baptist Church on 7th Street. There is a historic association between the Seminary and the Baptist Church. The Cedar Valley Seminary was founded at Osage as a Baptist academy in 1862 by joint efforts of Rev. Alva Bush, the citizens of Osage, and the Cedar Valley Baptist Association. When the Seminary opened in 1862, classes were held in the courthouse and continued at that location until the end of the 1868-1869 school year. By 1864 it was clear to the Cedar Valley Baptist Association that there was sufficient interest in Osage for a more permanent location and they worked with the inhabitants of Osage to create the Cedar Valley Seminary as a non-sectarian educational institution. When the Seminary opened in 1869, the Baptist Church in Osage had no building of its own and the trustees of the Seminary agreed to give the church the use of the chapel in the Seminary building on the condition they would furnish and finish the room. This continued until 1885 when the Baptist Church was built. This new location ties the Seminary building to that historic relationship that resulted in the founding of the institution.

The Seminary building will be moved in its entirety. The new foundation will be concrete block below ground level, but the above ground portion will be a veneer using the stone from the historic limestone foundation visible in the original building. The new setting will be graded so there will be steps to enter the building's front door. The front elevation will be the same at the new location as the old location. It will be bordered by a residential neighborhood on the east and north sides, a neighborhood similar in character to its former location. Though the building will be rotated 180°, the new orientation will not impact the architectural integrity of the building. There is no evidence that the placement of the building on its current site gave consideration to orienting the altar to the east or to any solar or other natural influences. The building design was dictated by a regular, symmetrical window pattern rather than any apparent environmental influence. The primary function of the building at the time of its design and placement on the site was for education. The incidental, occasional use of a portion of the building as a chapel came after the building's construction commencement. While some religious traditions at the time may suggested a preference for an easterly orientation of the altar, the non-sectarian, educational intent of the developer of the building suggests that such considerations would not have a bearing on the building's orientation.

 Wolfe House & Building Movers have been contracted to move the building. They will be using a Unified Hydraulic Jacking System and employ state-of-the-art remote controlled Buckingham Power Dollies. They have extensive experience moving historic buildings. During the preparation for and completion of the move, care will be taken by

the Cedar Valley Seminary Foundation and the Mitchell County Historical Society to protect and preserve any historical artifacts that may be uncovered.

There will be an addition built on the north side of the building (the south side at its current location). The addition will be designed in accordance with and commitment to the standards of the Secretary of Interior. The addition will be compatible with the existing structure. It will allow for a handicapped accessible entrance with an elevator that goes from the basement to the second floor. It will also provide space for bathrooms and mechanical equipment. The window openings will be incorporated into the doorway from the addition to the original building. Similar materials will be used for the addition to complement the original structure, but not duplicate it. The square footage of the footprint of the historic building is 2,492 square feet. The square footage of the addition will be kept to a minimum. The addition will not dominate the new site and it will allow the building to be functional in the 21st century.

NARRATIVE

The Cedar Valley Seminary building will retain its eligibility for the National Register under Criterion C as a significant example of late 1860s Italianate collegiate architecture in Osage and Iowa. Research indicates that when it became a junior college in 1916, it was the first junior college in Iowa. This resource retains very good integrity in its architectural design and will remain intact.

None of the buildings to be removed contribute to a listed or historic district. Furthermore, they do not retain sufficient integrity or significance for individual listings.

ANALYSIS OF NEW LOCATION

In searching for a new location, the Foundation was unable to find an empty city block in the City's core that would allow the building to retain east orientation of the front entrance. The proposed site is located one block east of the current location and thus the building will remain near its original site. This new site is located a half block from the community's historic district created in the Central Business District. The site will require the removal of two business buildings and two homes. Site inventories have been completed for these structures and none were deemed historically significant or eligible for the National Register.

The available Sanborn fire insurance maps show the new location to have contained two residential dwellings and their associated outbuildings in 1888. The dwellings were located in Lots 7 and 9, with Lots 8 and 10 vacant lots. This remained the configuration of these lots until 1897 when the house on Lot 10 was under construction. The 1897 map actually labeled the footprint of this dwelling as the foundation for a dwelling indicating that it was then under construction in August of that year. By 1905 two outbuildings had been added to the rear of Lot 10, with the configuration of the other lots remaining the same to circa 1944 when the dwelling in Lot 7 was removed and a filling station built on the corner of this lot at N. 7th and Chase (Free) streets. The vacant Lot 8 was now occupied by an office building. The houses on Lots 9 and 10 were still in place in 1944 but the outbuildings had been replaced with automobile garages, one for each lot. Since the 1944 map, the filling station has been removed (and likely the underground tanks excavated as well) and a modern building and parking lot built over the entirety of Lot 7. The office building in Lot 8 is still extant as are the two dwellings on Lots 9 and 10 but these will be removed for the proposed moving of the Seminary building to this location.

Leah D. Rogers, Principal Archaeologist at Tallgrass Historians L.C. in Iowa City, reviewed the historic maps for the new location. It can be stated that the construction of the modern building coupled with the demolition of the original house and its later replacement with a filling station that would have had underground tanks (and were also removed in the modern era) would have heavily impacted Lot 7 making it unlikely that intact archaeological sites of significance would remain at this location. Furthermore, the construction of the later office building on the previously vacant Lot 8 would also have impacted most of that lot, which appeared to have little or no potential for historic archaeological deposits due to its vacant lot history. As for Lots 9 and 10, there would be some potential for intact archaeological features and deposits in the rear yard area of the dwellings; however, it is unlikely that such deposits would be considered significant enough for National Register eligibility because of the ineligibility of the associated houses. Therefore, there appears to be a very low potential for the proposed move of the Seminary building to these lots to adversely impact significant archaeological properties.

FUTURE PLANS

Once in its new location, the Seminary building will serve as an exhibit hall and venue. There will be exhibit space on the first floor to recognize persons of note from Mitchell County. Educational displays will be created to highlight area individuals who have demonstrated leadership.

The second floor will have a full kitchen and dining area in the smaller back room and an event hall in the front room. The space will accommodate 100-125 people, providing a venue for leadership events, meetings, performances, reunions, showers, and other celebrations and public functions.

SUMMARY

The Cedar Valley Seminary was one of the earliest institutions of higher learning in north central Iowa and in 1916, became the first Junior College in the state. From its inception, it had a close relationship with the Cedar Valley Baptist Association and with the Baptist Church in Osage, Iowa. In fact, from 1869 – 1885, the Baptist used the assembly hall as their chapel until the Baptist Church was built. The Cedar Valley Seminary building will be located across the alley from the Baptist Church that was instrumental to its founding.

The Seminary building will be rehabilitated using the Secretary of Interior Standards. Consideration is being given to using historic tax credits. The addition will be designed in accordance with the Secretary of Interior Standards and will be compatible with the historic structure.

Once renovation is completed, the Cedar Valley Seminary will once again serve the community in an educational capacity providing space for displays and programs focusing on leaders who came from Mitchell County and Northeast Iowa. It will provide a central location for collecting, archiving, and sharing photographs, stories, and the history of the hundreds of accomplished graduates of the Cedar Valley Seminary and Junior College, and graduates of the schools in Mitchell County and the surrounding area.
