STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): Architecturally, this house is significant as an excellent intact example of the early 20th century Craftsmanstyle Bungalow residence. Characteristic features include its low massing, asymmetrical arrangement of gables, brick construction, stuccoed gables, and Craftsman detailing in brackets, rafter ends, gables and windows. Its linear floor plan is suggestive of the ranch house, which succeeded the Bungalow as America's popular medium-priced house.
