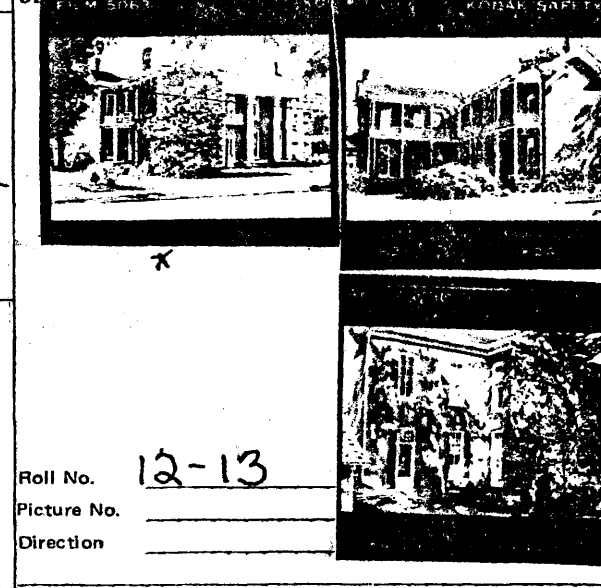

Description **Two-story brick - segmental arched windows - stone quoins - (later door?) on both floors, and portico - mantle in left parlor probably replacement (Federal) - Tuscan cornice original - service stair behind left parlor - Double gallery in angle of ell - original 2 story ell - unboned brick front (common bond) - monumental portico replaced double gallery - Federal style door units of main facade (elliptical arched) are perhaps original, but probably replacements**

19. History **Pleasant Hines built for daughter - Wilson's owned before Stewarts - Judge Pleasant Hines gave this land to his daughter and her husband Capt. W.H. Everhardt. College St. was then known as Bridge St. This structure was built soon after that. Columns and doorway were replaced by later owners.**

20. Significance **Throughout the early part of Bowling Green's history the Hines family played an important role. This is evidenced by the beautiful homes that in which they lived. Particularly clear illustration of a popular style**
