Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Situated at the southeast corner of Fourth and Dartmouth, one of the major intersections of Newell, the large two-and-a-half story rectangular brick house has a hip roof and a wood porch. Extending from the south (rear) side of the house is a one-story frame addition with a shed roof. The detached frame two-car garage is modern.

Supported by slender Roman Doric columns, the porch wraps around the building on the north and east facades. Wood cresting crowns a portion of the porch. Above the two-story bay windows located on both the north and east facades are a pedimented gable roof with fish scale shingles and a small square window. The original rectangular windows are 1/1 sash and have red granite lintels and sills.

The central-plan interior displays oak trim, floors and columns dividing some of the lower level rooms. Interior features also include oak pocket doors, the original lighting fixtures, beams, panelling, shutters, and kitchen appliances (stoves, etc.) The front door has an oval beveled glass panel. The current owner has thoughtfully restored and decorated the interior (including the selection of wall and floor coverings) to compliment the historic decor.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Kenaston House is significant in the areas of architecture and for its association with an important Newell merchant.

The house was built by <u>William G. Kenaston</u> between 1906-1911. During this time, the town of Newell was in its infancy, yet growing steadily due to the influx of settlers into Butte County as well as the impact of the extension of the railroad line. The Kenaston family was one of the town's earliest and most prominent citizens. Owning one of the first general stores and operating the Kenaston Bank, their financial success was reflected in their house. Today, the building, which is one of the largest in town, is still known by many as the "Kenaston House," an indication of the family's importance in the town's history.

Over the years, the past and present owners have restored and maintained the house so many of its original features have survived. These include the original lighting fixtures, pocket doors, shutters, beams and oak floors, panelling, and columns. Furthermore, the original Franklin stove, an appliance rarely saved over the years is still intact in the kitchen.
