(photo 5) Single vertical board-batten shutter with strap hinges. Originally had a chimney on the N half of the W end wall (not centered in gable), [unique] but it fell down and was filled in. Corner stair arises from rear along E end wall; one small

(photo 6) Pegged frame window at rear; one window front wall only 3rd floor; single small windows in each gable of attic. Access to ground floor from outside rear door only; heven ceiling joists; spring flows through opening in wall to Houston Creek which runs through the farm. (photos 2, 3)

Main house on farm burned about 1924 and was replaced by present Colonial Revival brick, retaining old common bond brick all.

Farm has lots of rock fencing and 19th C. stock barn.

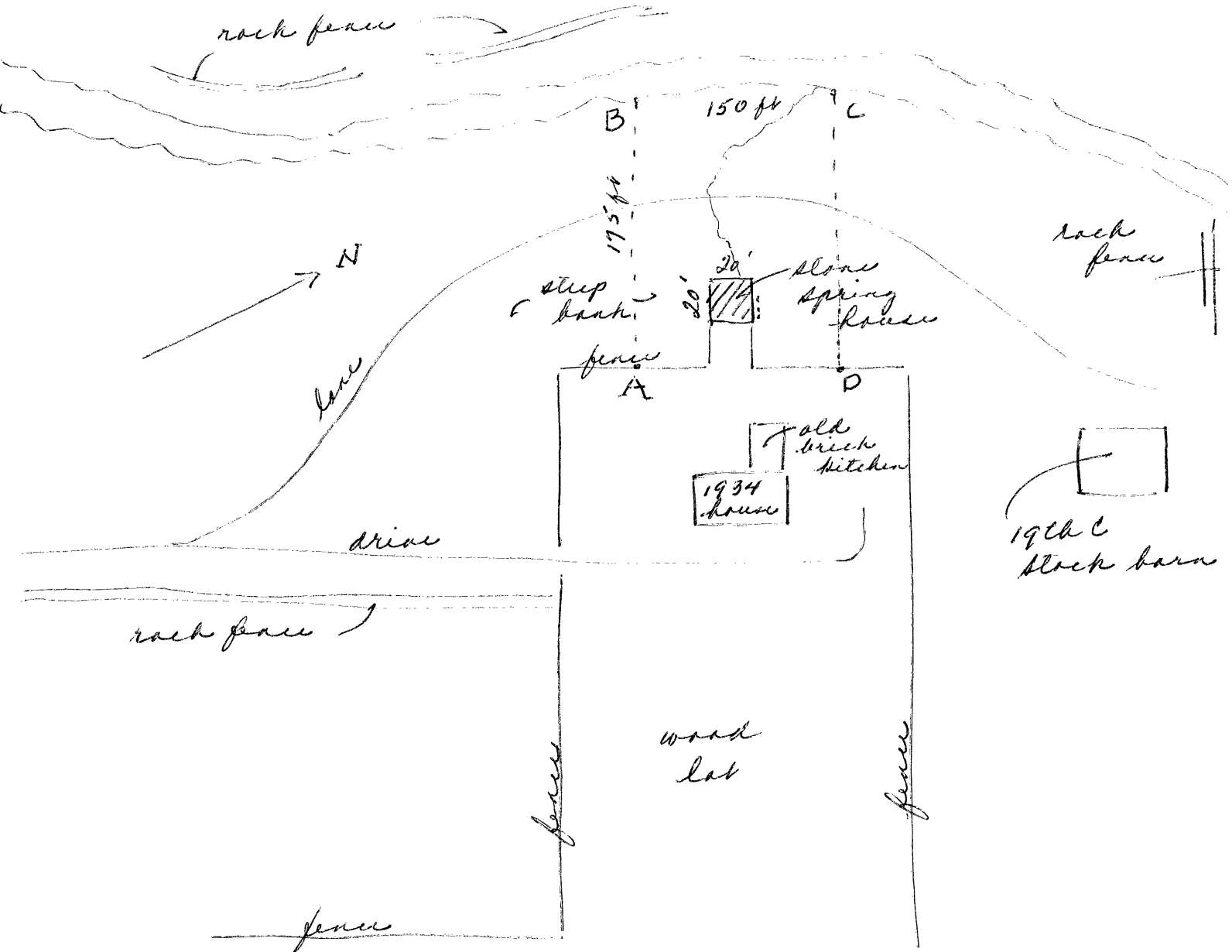
Leighton - Mayville. His two unmarried daughters lived in the stone house because they felt it was improper to be at the hotel.

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION & JUSTIFICATION

Beginning at A, 75 ft NE of the W corner of the yard, thence NW perpendicular to fence 175 ft to B at creek bank, thence with creek NE 150 ft to C, thence SE parallel to A-B 175 to the fence at D, thence with fence and across door yard to of Stone house SW 150 ft to the beginning - about 2/3 acre.
