

The nominated property is the east 90' of city lot 61. The boundary includes the part of the city lot that has historically been associated with the building. Boundary A-B is on the west side of Market Street, and boundary D-A is on the south side of First Street.

45. Description and House Plan:

The rectangular mass of this combination store and dancehall is emphasized by the parapet gable-ends, which conceal the shallow pitched roof. The wall surface is broken with recessed panels that mark the bays, four on the front and rear faces and two on the sides; some of the panels are set with windows and others are blind. The storefront is original, as are the separate doorways on the main (north) front and the First Street side of the building.

The hoodmolds over the upper windows of the main front and the principal architectural elements of the storefront are of cast metal; other lintels are of plain stone. The lower sashes of the double-hung windows have been replaced with aluminum storm windows, but the original 6-pane upper sashes remain, concealed by plywood. The two-car garage of concrete block construction is a mid-20th century addition to the south face of the building.

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
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
