DESCRIPTION

ARCHITECTURAL STYLE McClelland Front-Gable DATE c. 1877 2 story, three-bay, front-gable main block with 2-story gabled FORM pavilion west side; polygonal window bay east side; full-length veranda, extended across an enclosed sunroom on southwest corner brick construction on limestone foundation; stone sills MATERIALS FENESTRATION 1/1 d.h.s., primarily segmented arches over window and door openings, with slightly FEATURES projecting brick hoods with keystones; entrance has original paneled double doors; wooden cornice frieze with molding strip and simple brackets existing veranda is probably early 20th century, as may be the ALTERATIONS sunroom inserted into the re-entrant angle between main block and west side pavilion SITE

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE This house, although located in the McClellan Heights district, is more properly associated with the Village of East Davenport, an industrial community established in the 1850's primarily as a lumber milling center. The house is a representative example of the "McClelland" form, which was built in significant numbers throughout Davenport from the late 1860's until nearly the turn of the century. Bracketted eaves and a polygonal bay window on one side suggest Italianate influences. The round-arched attic windows in the front gable end are a recurring motif in 19th century Davenport's domestic architecture. HISTORICAL DATA Diedrick Busch, a Prussian immigrant, built this residence around 1877. The Busch family formerly lived above their business, a grocery store in the Village of East Davenport a few blocks to the west. Busch built a number of residential and commercial buildings in the East Davenport area. He retired in 1883, and died ten years later, in his 11th Street home.
