The building is 45'-5" across the front and 37' deep. Four massive "H" frames comprise the main structure. Six sills lie on flat stones. 11"x11" posts support 10"x16" beams all mortised and tenoned together and fastened with trunnels. These beams are finely finished, possibly with an adz as only Dutch barns had adzed beams. Very long roof rafters are balanced near midpoint on purlins running front to back, leaving sidewalls relatively weight free. Construction is largely oak and tulipwood. Closely spaced long poles lie on beams making rude hay loft floor. Central portion of barn has wood threshing floor. Side aisles for stalls have dirt floors. There are two large wagon doors front and rear, and one front access dopr.\*This may have been changed as normally there would be one small door to each side aisle. Roof rafters and original studs are spaced about 3'-0" on centers. There is no ridge pole. Shingle nailers are old oak but probably not original as roof most likely was thatched. Old shingles remain but are covered now with asphalt shingles. Some original clapboards may remain but have been covered over on two sidewalls by Novelty siding. Exterior is stained red. Within the past 10 years a small section inside was enclosed as an office and two windows were added.

Condition is fairly good, roof seems watertight but gutters need replacing along with a few rotted timbers particularly one corner post. Some evidence of borers and other insect infestation seems to be arrested.

\* There is another small and old door immediately next to the large front door which may have been moved from right front. It is hidden in the photo.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This building is unique as it is a true Dutch barn and is one of the few remaining in the State of New Jersey. The Lower Rhenish style barn evolved in the Netherlands and was brought over to the Hudson River Valley. This type is the most European of American barns and may be the earliest example of barn building in the United States. (They are described more thoroughly in T.J. Wortenbach's "Middle Colonies".) A similar barn to the Wortendyke barn was built in 1642 at Achter Col, now Bogota, New Jersey. This barn is believed to have been built about 1770 at the time many improvements were made to the farm and home of Frederick Wortendyke. In the early part of this century someone attaiced the numerals "1803" over the door but no one knows the source.
