7. Description

Located on a corner lot at 301 N. 5th Street in Marlow, Stephens County, Oklahoma, this home was built in 1904. A detached, one family, two and one-half story, residential home, the Montgomery-Liman house is an early plains type which borrows from the Queen Anne, Victorian, Western Stick and Prairie styles. The home, approximately 60 feet by 70 feet, fronts to the east and has weather board siding on the first story and clapboard siding on the upper levels. A porch, with knee-high wooden railing of ornamental design, extends across the front of the home. An uncovered deck above the downstairs porch also has decorative, knee-high railing. The home is basically symmetrical with one central entry. The foundation is brick. Six doric columns rise from the brick porch pedestals to support the second-story deck. The roof is hipped and flared with metal crestwork for decoration, and there is a railed captain's walk across the central part of the top of the roof. There are two dormers in the roof on the east front side. Flared pediments supported by paired brackets are above small entablatures with dentil molding horizontal to framed windows. There is a gable over the main body of the front of the house, and on the north and south sides are other gables matching the one in the front. Both the north and south gables are within the roof-story level. Each gable has dentil molding recessed with brackets supporting the gables and a semi-circular, fan-like, shingling. The only alteration to this home is that the old chimney was replaced at a later date with a new, large, rectangular, brick chimney which also had later repairs. However, this addition and later repair does not detract from the overall integrity of the home.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Primarily significant because of its architecture, the Montgomery-Liman home is in an old residential area in Marlow and was in earlier days one of the most substantial homes in the town. It stands as a symbol of what the well-to-do valued in housing in early 20th century Stephens County. The home was an early center representing culture and refinement in the county. Further, the house is one of the best remaining examples of plains architecture in south central Oklahoma. The home borrows from the Queen Anne, Victorian, western stick, and prairie styles. The charm and style of the home is visably apparent.

The Montgomery-Liman home is significant for varied reasons. Built and occupied in 1904, the home originally belonged to the Montgomery family, one of the most prominent families in early day Marlow. A well-to-do merchant, Mr. Montgomery and his wife frequently entertained both in and out of town guests in the large home. The property remained in the Montgomery family for decades, but in the 1970s passed into the hands of the Tom Liman family, Mr. Liman being a local businessman.


Also the home is significant as a symbol of change once the Santa Fe Railroad came through Marlow. The railroad made the town economically viable and prosperous. And those who prospered, like the Montgomery family, tried to bring refinement and eastern "civilization" to south central Oklahoma.
