DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Severson Barn is a two-story structure of irregularly-cut limestone (locally obtained) measuring 30' x 32'. Walls are 18 inches thick, the stones held in place by a lime mortar. The gable roof was once covered with wood shingles, recently replaced with cedar "shakes". Rafter ends project beneath the eaves.

There is a variety of window and door openings. On the west side are a double-door entrance (wide to accommodate animals), and an opening to the hay loft above. The long sides feature small, almost square openings framed in wood, for ventilation purposes. On the east side are a door and two very small openings, on the south another opening to the loft and several of the small, square openings. Rectangular pieces of metal, set at irregular heights below the eaves, indicate tie rods. All the door and larger window openings have lintels of hewn timber. The loft is supported by similar heavy timbers, a number of which are still in place. The ground level has a dirt floor, the loft flooring was originally of planks.

The barn is set near the Deer Creek, in a grassy area surrounded by woodland. There are a number of frame buildings in the area, but they are later and are not included in the nomination.

8 SIGNIFICANCE

This stone barn is a remnant from one of the eadlest settlements in Mitchell County. Newburg Township, in which the barn is located, was first settled in 1854, largely by Norwegians, possibly members of the Norwegian immigration movement led by the Reverend C.L. Clausen, whose colonizing efforts in Wisconsin, Minnesota and northern Iowa are an important part of the region's history. Among these Norwegians were brothers Ole and Nels Severson. Ole is said to have built a log house on Deer Creek, probably near the site of this barn, which was built by his brother Nels in 1867. Ole died in 1854, shortly after his arrival, but Nels lived on to have a large family, serve in the Civil War with the 13th Iowa Infantry, and hold "several local offices".

Severson's barn was one of the few (and possibly the only) stone structures in the area of this Deer Creek settlement. For this reason, and because of its relatively large size, the early white inhabitants may have considered it an ideal shelter, or defensive structure, in the event of Indian attack. Although such danger never materialized (indeed, the periods of greatest Indian unreast in the area, the Spirit Lake massacre and the New Ulm uprising, had occurred years before, in 1857 and 1862), local tradition invested the structure with the name "fort", by which it is known today. Such a military designation for a structure built essentially for wholly different purposes was not uncommon on the American frontier -- objects as disparate as a church, a farmhouse, or a hastily-erected arrangement of sod walls also bore -- and bear -- the designation "fort".

Because it was situated along the road from Northwood (Minnesota) to St. Ansgar (Iowa), it has been suggested that the barn may have served as a stage-coach stop and shelter for wagon teams. Local tradition also says that travellers were accommodated in the barn, but its construction (no chimney or fireplace, in particular) does not effectively corroborate this. Possibly a nearby frame structure, long gone, was the actual inn.

These traditions, although lacking contemporary corroboration, contribute much to the local affection for Nels Severson's barn. With or without them, the barn is a lovingly crafted instance of frontier building, using local materials in a simple, enduring way.
