#20 Significance (continued)

Frederick Stipp is the probable original owner, as he is buried in the family cemetery on the grounds. Stipp was a son-in-law of the famous Clark County pioneer, William Clinkenbeard, whose home stands along the Paris Pike (see Ck 188). The unsuitable size and location of the house, far off the Van Meter Road and directly behind the Pendleton House appears to have led to its abandonment as a residence by 1877.
