Narrative Description

The Two Rivers Post Office is an imposing building located in the downtown business district of Two Rivers, Wisconsin. The one story building was built in 1933 of red brick with limestone trim in a Georgian Revival style. The plan of the building is irregular; the front portion, containing the main lobby, has a hipped roof, the roof of the back portions of the building is flat. The entire building sits on an elevated limestone foundation.

The building cornerstone notes: "William H. Woodin, Secretary of the Treasury, James A. Farley, Postmaster General, Lawrence W. Robert, Jr., Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, James A. Wetmore, Acting Supervising Architect, George Schley and Sons, Perce G. Schley, Architect, 1933."

The façade of the Two Rivers Post Office consists of a five-bay central portion flanked by projecting end pavilions. The central bay of the façade contains the entry doors. Above the doors is a fifteen light window. The window and doors are contained within a limestone surround. At the top is a cartouche decorated with an eagle. Full height Tuscan pilasters divide the five bays of the central portion. The pilasters visually support a large, stone entablature and a denticulated cornice. The windows in the four flanking bays are twelve over twelve, double hung. The lintels are of brick with a limestone keystone. Below each window is a panel of brick headers. This is contrast to the remaining wall treatment, which is laid in Flemish bond. All the windows of the main block are treated in this fashion. The side pavilions are framed by limestone quoins and each contains a single window. Above the cornice is a balustraded parapet. The limestone balusters are aligned with the window and door openings of the main block. Basement windows are located below each of the windows of the main block. The front door is reached by granite stairs with concrete sidewalls. The light fixtures on these sidewalls appear to be original.

The twelve over twelve window configuration is carried on all four sides of the building. The side elevations consist of the main block with quoins and a balustraded parapet. There are three windows on this portion of the side elevation. The south elevation steps back slightly to set the back portion off from the main block. The north elevation has two set. The rear elevation features a loading dock.

The interior has a terrazzo floor and a marble wainscot. The walls and ceiling are of plaster. The coved ceiling has denticulated molding. The building retains its original wood vestibule and trim and there is a green marble arch in the lobby. Alterations include a modern glass divider to separate portions of the lobby and modern lighting fixtures. Overall, the building retains a high level of architectural integrity.

Statement of Significance

The Two Rivers Post Office is an intact example of a Federal post office in the context of the "United States Post Office Construction from 1913 to 1943, State of Wisconsin – Milwaukee District" Multiple Property Nomination.

The Two Rivers Post Office is being nominated under Criterion C for Architecture. The 1933 building is locally significant as an example of the Georgian Revival style applied to a public building.

Historic Context

This building is the first federally owned post office in Two Rivers. Prior to its construction in 1933, postal functions were carried out at a variety of locations depending on the local postmaster. Postal service in Two Rivers began in 1848 and the first Postmaster was Henry A. Tefft.¹

This post office was one of a series constructed in Wisconsin by the federal Public Works Administration in the 1930s. Built in 1933, it was one of the very first post offices built during the Roosevelt administration's Depression-era public works relief projects. The history of post office construction in Wisconsin in this period and under these programs is documented in the above-referenced multiple property nomination form.

The Two Rivers Post Office is one of a few in Wisconsin to have the name of a local architect attached to its construction. George Schley and Sons was a Milwaukee architectural firm specializing in period revival designs, mostly domestic, in the 1920s and 1930s. However, the Two Rivers Post Office is similar to the 1932 Waupun Post Office, which is credited to the Office of the Supervising Architect of the Treasury. A comparison of the two examples indicates the change in federal building practices between 1932 and 1933 and the impact of the Public Works Administration. The Waupun example is more elaborate and makes more use of stonework. By comparison, the Two Rivers Post Office indicates increasing government austerity in its building designs and practices. Stylistically, the greater simplification and austerity of materials and ornamentation allies the Two Rivers Post Office with the Georgian Revival Style, while the post office in Waupun is more closely associated with the Neo-Classical Revival.

Significance

The Two Rivers Post Office meets the registration requirement for a Federally owned post office as specified in the multiple property nomination for post office construction in Wisconsin from 1913 to 1943. The building is significant under Criterion C for Architecture.

The 1933 Two Rivers Post Office is a locally significant example of the Georgian Revival. Stylistic elements of the style include quoins, a classical cornice, a hipped roof, a balustraded parapet, the use of double hung, multi-paned windows, and the use of Flemish bond. The Two Rivers example is grander than many of the other Georgian Revival post offices constructed in Wisconsin in the 1930s. This one is larger and has a higher degree of ornamentation, including the stone entablature and cornice, and the full story pilasters of its central section. However, as noted above, it is less elaborate than those examples built shortly before.

The exterior of the building with its decorative features remains intact. The interior, including the terrazzo floor, marble wainscot, wood trim, vestibule, marble arch, and cove ceiling are also original. The building retains a high level of architectural integrity. In addition, the Wisconsin architectural inventory does not include any other examples of this style in the city of Two Rivers. In conclusion, the Two Rivers Post Office is eligible under Criterion C as a locally significant example of the Georgian Revival applied to a larger public building.
