

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The view afforded by the Bailey Hill prominence overlooking the city of Jackson readily explains why the Federal artillery would choose the site to construct three major works: earthern parapets, secondary positions behind these, and a rifle trench along the forward crest. The hill's elevation gave the gunners an extra half-mile in range, an advantage which allowed them to hit the center of the city with their shells. These earthworks remain in excellent condition today and are little affected by nature because the hill is well drained.

Shortly before the turn of the century the hill was utilized as a burial site for paupers interred by the county. Except for a very few markers supplied for veterans by the government, there is little indication of these graves, and no records are available which indicate the number of graves on the hill. However, there will be no future burials on the site, which is located within 16th section land set aside for educational benefit. Therefore, the site is provided a certain degree of protection and will play an important role in interpreting the Siege of Jackson.

The Civil War earthworks located on Bailey Hill are the best preserved fortifications of their kind in Jackson. They were once part of the Federal army's siege line which formed a semi-circle around the city from the Pearl River on the north to the Pearl on the south. Very few remains of this line exist today. The Bailey/Hill earthworks played a vital role during the Siege of Jackson, July 9-16, 1863, when the site was occupied by the 7th Michigan Light Artillery, the 1st Battery Wisconsin Light Artillery, and the 33rd Wisconsin Infantry Regiment. The artillery was commanded by Captain Jacob T. Foster and the infantry by Colonel Jonathan B. Mogre. The 33rd Wisconsin was a part of Brigadier General Jacob Q. Lauman's Fourth Division, Sixteenth Army Corps, which had been temporarily attached, along with eleven other regiments, to the Thirteenth Army Corps and placed in line between the Jackson and New Orleans Railroad and the Pearl River.

On the morning of July 12, General Lauman ordered his already advanced line forward without orders from his superiors. Colonel Isaac C. Pugh of the 41st Illinois describes the advance in his report.

I was ordered by General Lauman to move my line forward cautiously, which order I obeyed. After passing a small creek (Lynch), Lined with timbers and dence underbrush, my command arrived in the open field, when I halted and had my line dressed I did not like the looks of the ground. up. There was a corn-field in front, beyond which there was a skirt of timber, and beyond that the timber had been felled. The fences had been laid down, and the corn cut down, except a strip immediately in I ordered one of my aides to front of my line. request General Lauman's presence on the ground, as I did not like the appearance of the field, and when the general came up he ordered the skirmishers to be pushed forward to the distance of 300 or 400 yards, and then gave the order to my brigade to

'forward' which order was obeyed. As soon as the line had crossed the field and had got fairly into the timber, the enemy opened a murderous fire on my whole line, but the men and officers pressed forward until they got within 120 yards of the enemy's breastworks when they took shelter behind the fallen timber, but the fire was so murderous that what officers and men were left fell back . .

During this time the batteries situated on the high hill poured shot and shell into the Confederate line, thus preventing a countercharge against the withdrawing Federal infantry. His brash and unauthorized action cost Lauman over 580 casualties and his command. Immediately after the advance, Major General Edward O. C. Ord removed Lauman from command and placed the Fourth Division under the able Brigadier General Alvin P. Hovey.

Hovey's report of the action gave special mention to the artillery posted on the hill: ". . . two sections of Foster's battery, one commanding the railroad and one on the high prominence to the right of the road, did fine execution by throwing their 20-pound shot and shell into the enemy's works and the heart of the city."

Under cover of darkness on the night of July 16, General Joseph E. Johnston's army evacuated Jackson and marched toward Morton. The Federal army did not realize that the Confederates had entirely abandoned the trenches until the next morning after token artillery resistance gave way. By that time, the army had safely crossed the Pearl River.
