

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Description The Camp Beauregard Memorial is approximately eleven feet tall and consists of the granite monument and a concrete base. The concrete base may have been added in the 1930s. The base is approximately three feet tall and is stepped up from the ground. The monument is granite, approximately eight feet tall. It is rough cut stone in the general shape of a conventional tombstone, except for the embellishments. A Confederate battle flag is draped across the top of the monument and the face of it is inscribed. The inscription reads: "1861-1865 Camp Beauregard Memorial in memory of the men who died here for the Confederate State of America and were denied the glory of heroic service in a battle -- Erected by the Kentucky Division United Daughters of the Confederacy and the Beauregard Monument Association of Louisiana." The monument is atop a hill just south of the Camp Beauregard Cemetery.

Statement of Significance The Camp Beauregard Memorial meets National Register criterion A and is significant within the context of "Civil War Monuments in Kentucky, 1861-1935." This monument is a good example of the property type "tombstone." This monument was erected in 1909 by the Kentucky Division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy and the Beauregard Monument association of Louisiana. The monument was erected both near the site of Camp Beauregard and near a cemetery. The marker was put up to honor Gen. Beauregard and the memory of the men who died at the camp. It is a tribute to the Lost Cause.

Verbal Boundary Description - The camp Beauregard Memorial whose boundaries form a circle with a radius of fifteen feet centered on the monument located just south of the Camp Beauregard cemetery.

Verbal Boundary Justification - The area associated with the monument is restricted to the ground on which the monument sits and a small buffer around it. The setting outside such a restricted area is not seen as critically important to maintaining an integrity of association. Because the focus of the multiple property submissions is the significance of the monuments, their proposed area of listing will reflect that they have been considered by-and-large, in isolation from their surrounds.
