#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Fitz-Hugh Hall is a Neo-classical Revival mansion located on the southern side of Chambers Street in the old southern suburban area of Vicksburg. A two-story symmetrical central block is flanked by one-story porches with Tuscan columns, full entablatures with modillioned cornices, flat roofs, and parapet railings of an "x" design. The porch to the west is surmounted by a columned and latticed sleeping porch. The central block is constructed of brick laid in a Flemish bond pattern. It is set upon a full basement and is topped by a green tile hipped roof. Rising from the roof are four inside-end brick chimneys and several pedimented dormers with leaded-glass casement windows framed by pilasters. A boldlyprojecting oversize modillion cornice encircles the house and joins with frieze and architrave to form the enormous full entablature that adorns the massive single-bay portico centered on the northerly five-bay facade. The portico rises from a full-width terrace railed by heavy cast-concrete balusters set between stucco piers. The pediment of the portico is lit by a half-round fanlight and is topped by a ridge finial like those on the dormers. The portico is supported by two pairs of giant-order Tuscan columns of sandstone or cast concrete. The corner columns are echoed on the front wall by paneled pilasters. Centered on the wall between the pilasters is a front door designed as a variation on the Palladian motif. Its half-round arch is closed by a fanlight which crowns a pair of paneled doors. A bold cornice outlines the curve of the arch and continues as part of a full entablature that spans only the two sidelights. Each leaded-glass sidelight is flanked on the door side by a slender column and on the wall side by a pilaster. Above the door is a three-part rectangular window. The other windows have cast-stone sills and keystones and are filled with one-over-one double-hung sash and louvered exterior The flat arches of the upper windows are splayed; the half round blinds. arches of the lower windows are closed with patterned brick. The rear of the main block is sheltered by a two-story porch located in the angle formed by the junction of a rear ell. The porch is supported on the firststory level by a picturesque brick arcade that opens onto a terrace.

The interior floor plan of the house is irregular. A grand entrance hall is separated from a shallow vestibule entry by an arrangement of arched, double-leaf leaded-glass doors set within leaded-glass sidelights and transom. A full molded entablature supported by fluted pilasters visually divides the hallway into a front entrance hall and a shallower The dog-leg stair, which has square-sectioned balusters, a stair hall. newel of clustered balusters, and decorative scroll work, is broken by a wide landing with an oval projection giving the illusion of a balcony. The landing is lighted by a large expanse of stained and leaded-glass casement windows and transoms. The hallway provides access to the dining room on the east and the parlor and library on the west. The hallway, parlor, and dining room are all lavishly trimmed with molded cornices and paneled wainscoting. Robust classical mantel pieces serve as the focal point of the parlor and dining room. The library mantel piece is more severe and bookcases replace the wainscoting of the other public rooms.

Leaded-glass pocket doors separate both the hallway from the dining room and the parlor from the library. The parlor mantel piece is flanked by leaded-glass double-leaf doors and sidelights that open onto the western side porch, which was originally enclosed with casement windows set beneath transoms and is finished with paneled walls and a coffered Parquet floors are an additional decorative feature of the first ceiling. story. Both the first and second stories have molded two-panel doors, molded baseboards, and window and door surrounds with two, molded fascias. A rear ell extends from the dining room and contains the large butler's pantry, kitchen, and a secondary hallway with back stairway running from the basement to the attic. The second story contains five bedrooms and a second-story sitting room, all accessed from an L-shaped hallway. Bedrooms are connected by three bathrooms with an additional bathroom located within the upper rear porch. Bedrooms are similarly, but more plainly trimmed than the first-story rooms. The large attic is finished in horizontal beaded-board and consists of a large, unpartitioned space with eave closets. Unusual interior survivals are the original lighting devices, hardware, plumbing fixtures, dining room over-mantel mirror, and built-in cabinets throughout the house.

Original outbuildings are limited to a brick garage with pyramidal roof and a small green house.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Fitz-Hugh Hall is Vicksburg's most significant Neo-classical Revival residence. This significance is based on its high degree of architectural its outstanding architectural and decorative arts itegrity, and finish, its long time association with the locally prominent Fitz-Hugh family. The house was probably constructed shortly after 1910, when William Henry Fitz-Hugh, prominent local merchant, acquired the first portion of the property on Chambers Street (Warren County Deed Book 117:547) in one of Vicksburg's most fashionable early twentieth-century neighborhoods. According to a Fitz-Hugh family member, the house was designed by Phillip N. Stern, a Fredericksburg, Virginia, architect who married into the Fitz-Hugh family. The Fitz-Hughs came to Vicksburg from Virginia, and architectural similarities support the family tradition that the house was designed to be a modern reflection of the exterior of Sabine Hall and of the interior of Carter's Grove (Frances Fitz-Hugh Powers, interviewed by William Thornton, at Vicksburg, Mississippi, 1982). The Fitz-Hugh family resided in the house until 1955. Fitz-Hugh Hall is one of Vicksburg's most finely finished early twentieth-century houses with its grand proportions, Flemish bond brickwork, outstanding interior millwork, and lavish use of leaded-glass. The house is a fitting architectural expression of Vicksburg's position as the premier city of Mississippi around the turn-of-the-century. The significance of Fitz-Hugh Hall is further enhanced by its outstanding integrity, which includes the survival of the original light fixtures, hardware, parlor overmantel mirror, library bookcases, pantry cabinets, bathroom cabinets, and plumbing fixtures. The house is today owned by Mr. and Mrs. William Thornton, whose respect for the integrity of the house will insure its careful preservation.
