## NATIONAL REGISTER CRITERIA STATEMENT (if applicable)

The Monadnock Road Historic District possesses integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association. It is significant as a reflection of Newton's rapid growth in the early 20th century, and the way in which former estates and open lands were subdivided to accommodate residential expansion. It is especially important as a cohesive and well preserved collection of early to mid-20th century houses which illustrates the styles and tastes popular during that period. The Monadnock Road Historic District meets criteria A & C of the NRHP.

## ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other areas within the community.

The Monadnock Road Historic District is located in the western part of Chestnut Hill. Centered on the winding length of Monadnock Road, it also includes portions of Tudor Road, Hammond Street, Hammondswood Road, Wachusett Road and Hobart Road. The eastern half of the district is part of the area laid out as the Liggett Estate subdivision in 1924. It is a quiet, pleasant neighborhood characterized by gentle hills, curving streets intersecting at angles, and large wooded and landscaped lots, all of which combine to provide a sense of privacy for each home. The houses were largely constructed in the 1920s with some from the 1910s and 1930s as well. They are large commodious structures, some of which are near estate quality. Styles represented include Craftsman, Colonial Revival, Tudor Revival, Spanish Colonial, and a handful of older Queen Anne houses and recent modern houses. A total of sixty-three houses are included.

## HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain historical importance of area and how the area relates to the development of other areas of the community. (see cont. sheet)

As first conceived by the Newton Boulevard Syndicate, Commonwealth Avenue (NC-B) - or the Newton Boulevard as it was then known, went only as far as Centre Street. Members of the Newton Boulevard Syndicate, which included among others Robert Bishop and several members of the Ward family, were willing to give cash and land in lieu of betterments if a route through their holdings was approved. A Boulevard Commission was established to study the project and in 1893, gave an interim report submitting the route proposed by the Newton Boulevard Syndicate to the city for surveys and estimates. The Commission's final report (which expanded the project through the city to the Charles River in Auburndale) gave Newton a major east-west road through its mid-section. In following the initial proposal of the Newton Boulevard Syndicate it opened a major portion of the city for development. Construction began in 1894 and Commonwealth Avenue was open to traffic the following year.

Almost immediately, infill in older areas of Chestnut Hill and Newton Centre, south of the new road, was stimulated and large landowners like Robert Bishop were able to begin to develop their property by the late 90s. With the exception of the Waban Hill area,

**ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE (cont.)**

Representative houses in the Monadnock Road Historic District are described below:

The most prevalent style in the area is the **Tudor Revival**, accounting for almost half of the houses. They are found throughout the area, but are most common on Monadnock and Tudor Roads in the actual subdivision. An excellent example of the style is provided by **112 Monadnock Road** (1927). It is a 2 1/2 story brick and half-timber structure enclosed by a slate hip roof with a facade gable and superimposed entry gable to the right. As is the case with other elaborate examples of the style, it employs cast stone as trim for the entry and for a large bank of windows spanning the first and second stories on the right facade. Another variant of the style is **107 Monadnock Road** (1923). This 2 1/2 story house is entirely clad with decorative half-timbering including curved and diamond shaped members. The facade is broken up by a dominant facade gable to the left with superimposed entry gable nearly centered on the facade. To the right is a large wall dormer and a lower roof slope which contains a sunporch. Upper story windows contain diamond pane sash adding to the surface complexity. The entry has a stone surround and is headed by a carved bargeboard more often seen on older Craftsman houses.

The **Colonial Revival** style is also well represented in the area, accounting for nearly a third of the houses. Most are well-developed two story five bay examples but Capes, Garrisons and Dutch Colonials are also found in limited numbers. The most elaborate example of the style and one which is individually outstanding is **59 Wachusett Road** (1918). Set on a rock faced hill and fronted by a balustraded terrace, it is a five bay brick structure rising two stories to a slate gable roof with pedimented dormers. It is trimmed with a heavy beltcourse separating the stories with quoins at the corners and at the slightly recessed center bay. The entry is treated with a balustraded porch with columns and carved consoles as supports. Windows contain 6/6 sash and are headed by splayed brick lintels with cast stone keystones. A balustraded sunporch projects from the left side to the plane of the terrace. Another good example is **137 Monadnock Road** (1927) which is also a large five bay brick structure rising two stories to a slate gable roof. Its entry is treated with sidelights and a Doric frieze beneath a lintel shelf, and is flanked by full length windows with arched heads. A typical Dutch Colonial is found at **50 Wachusett Road** (1906). Several Colonial/Craftsman hybrids exist as well. One is the two story stucco clad house at **63 Monadnock Road** (1906). Its stucco cladding, bracketed roof and pergola sunporch are all typical Craftsman features, but its entry with engaged Ionic columns supporting a pulvinated frieze and a heavy segmental pediment with modillions is pure Colonial Revival of the best quality. The most atypical example of the style is the

Spanish Colonial house at **21 Monadnock Road** (1910). Although it is not an outstanding example, it does employ the typical stucco clad wall surfaces, red tile roof on carved brackets and arched windows.

The **Craftsman** style is encountered less commonly, and often it is combined with Colonial or Tudor features. Almost all are stucco clad. Two similar examples are found at **11 Tudor Road** (1923) and **150 Monadnock Road** (1919). Both are the broad clipped gable end type found in limited numbers in several subdivisions. The Tudor Road house has a brick first story and stuccoed second story separated by a pent roof. The center entry has a Colonial surround with sidelights and a pedimented hood on consoles (see also 108 Hammond Street). The Monadnock Road house is entirely stucco clad and lack the pent roof. Its entry is treated with sidelights and a half-timbered pediment on Tuscan columns

**Verbal Boundary Description and Justification:** The Monadnock Road Historic District in western Chestnut Hill, contains 63 houses and 3 vacant lots on Mondanock Road, Tudor Road, Hammond Street, Hammondswood Road, Wachusett Road and Hobart Road. Boundaries are the lot lines of these properties as shown on the attached Engineering Map. The boundaries are drawn to recognize the unusually cohesive nature of this stylish residential area. Less distinguished and later buildings are excluded on all sides.

**HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE (cont.)**

development of property on the northside of Commonwealth Avenue up to Centre Street, much of it owned by the Ward family, was somewhat slower. After the turn-of-the-century the pace of development began to pick up; by the explosive period of the 1920s new subdivisions lay on both sides of Commonwealth Avenue. Development along Commonwealth Avenue itself moved generally from east to west and was also virtually completed by the late 1920s.

The Monadnock Road Historic District grew out of an 1895 subdivision drawn by Olmsted, Olmsted and Elliot for the Newton Boulevard Syndicate. Montvale Road and Terrace, which were part of the Syndicate plan, were built up before the turn of the century, but much of Monadnock and Wachusett Roads remained in flux and did not develop until the

teens and twenties. Most of the area was owned by syndicate member Robert Bishop who also owned all the property in the abutting Gray Cliff Expanded Historic District (NC-O)

The Monadnock Road Historic District includes part of the adjacent Liggett Estate, which was owned by Drug Store magnate Louis K. Liggett from 1916 to 1937. Liggett had begun to develop portions of his estate in 1919 and 1923, in the area of Tudor Road and the extension of Monadnock Road from Hammondswood Road. In 1941, after his death, the remainder of the estate and the house, which was modeled after a Welsh manor house (1895; Chapman and Frazer, architects), was given by Cardinal O'Connell to Boston College and became known as O'Connell Hall. It is now surrounded by several dormitories which occupy the east side of Tudor Road abutting the District.

A large number of well know local and Boston architects were responsible for commissions in this area. Houses developed by Louis Liggett, including **11 Tudor Road** and **107 Monadnock Road**, were designed by the well known Boston firm of Haven & Hoyt. Houses developed by the Cragie Realty Trust or the Nutting Realty Trust (trustees were the same in both cases) were designed by Newton architect Hawley W. Morton. These included **52, 84, and 104 Hammondswood Road, 45 Tudor Road, and 93, 96, 106, 112, 122, and 129 Monadnock Road**. (Real estate developer W. Mark Noble lived in the house at 122 Monadnock Road.) Architect Oscar Thayer designed the house at **10 Monadnock Road** which appeared in *The House Beautiful* September 1915. Architect Henry Richmond presumably designed his own house, built in c. 1906 at **63 Monadnock Road**. Harry Morton Ramsay designed houses at **71 and 72 Monadnock Road** and Newhall & Blevins designed **71 Hammondswood Road**. **59 Wachusett Road** was designed by F. J. Robinson. Other architects working in the area included Peare & Quiner, W. J. Freethy, Krokyn & Browne, Royal Barry Wills, David J. Abrahams, and George H. Sidebottom.

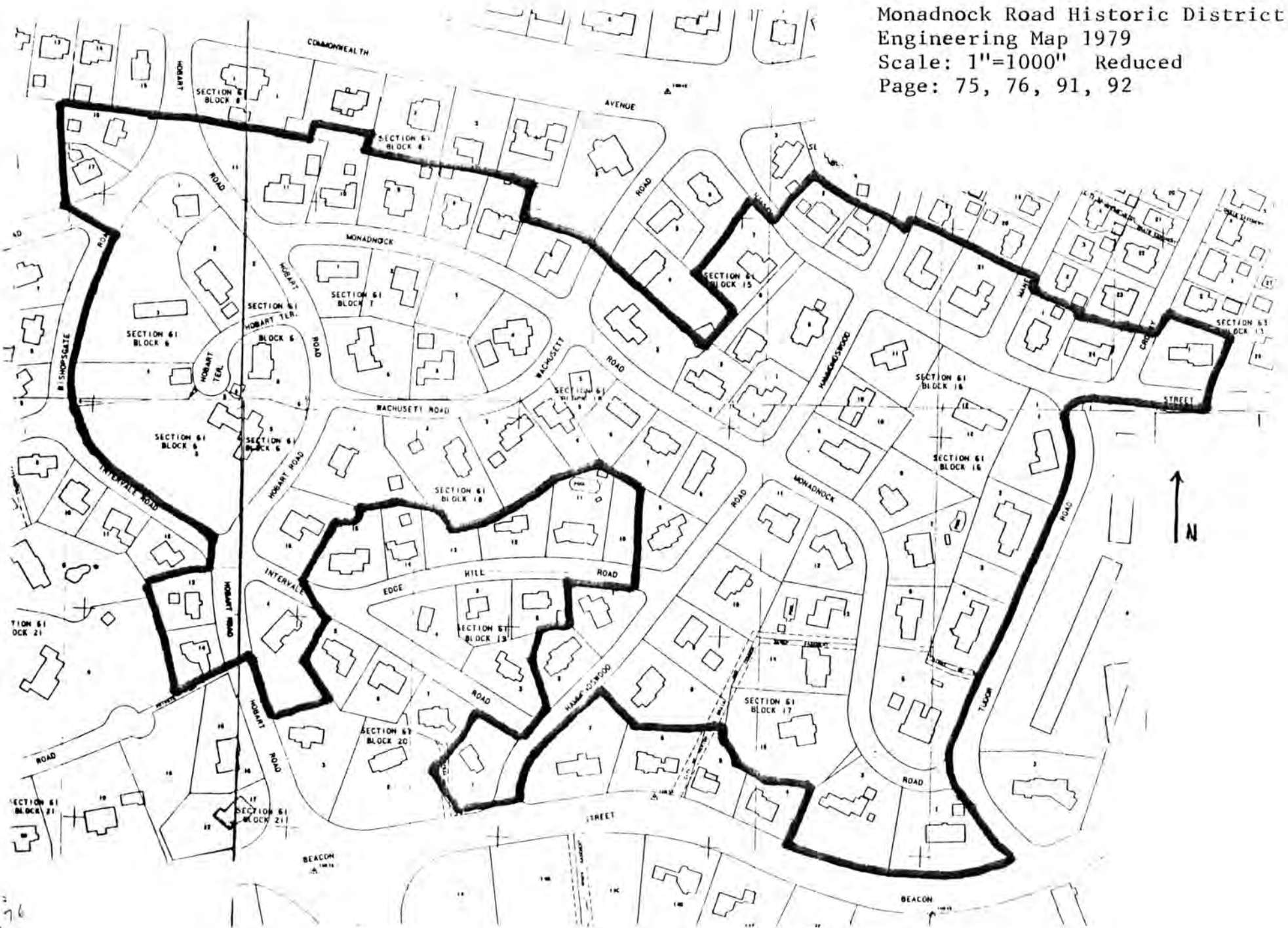
