Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Designed in the ecclectic tradition of late nineteenth century architecture, the Walker Memorial Building exhibits a variety of ornamentation that is characteristic of the period. The wood frame structure is two stories high and has a hipped roof broken by two gabled dormers and a corner tower. Although assymetrical, the composition of the principal (west) facade is carefully balanced between the two dormers and the tower. The exterior of the building manifests an assortment of textures through the combinations of clapboard, shingle and false "timber frame" sheathing. The windows consist of Queen Anne sash of different sizes organized singly or in groups of twos and threes. Queen Anne sash is also used in the panelled doors located on the north and west sides.

The tower is the main decorative feature of the building. On the west side is a small portico over the entrance to the stair tower which is modestly fashioned with wood posts resting on a shingled railing. Directly above are narrow stair windows with small scroll-shaped cresting. The belfry of the tower calls to mind rustic Stick Style design with its peaked gablets containing braced frame woodwork.

Statement of Significance (In one paragraph)

This excellent and rare example of a Queen Anne public building was designed by noted Portland architect, Frederick A. Tompson. Apart from its architectural significance, it is a survivor of the period when communities were much more closely knit than today and participated in group activities much more frequently. It also reflects an era when self-improvement through intellectual pursuits was a community affair.

The building was erected in the summer of 1892 and first used in January, 1893 by the Ridge Literary Aid Society. Joseph Walker, a wealthy summer resident left in his will \$5,000 used for the construction accompanied by the following stipulation:

"I have no objection to said sum being used and expended in whole or in part, for the erection of a building within the limits of said district (School District 18), said building to be used for the purpose of a library, or for lectures, or the promotion of agriculture, or expended in such manner as shall accomplish the greatest good to the largest number of residents of said district."

For many years Walker Memorial Hall served the Ridge people well. Sunday services were held in the summertime, Christmas parties, community suppers, dances, and amateur theatricals were included among the activities in the building. The only heat was provided by wood burning stoves which today add much to the turn-of-the-century charm of the interior.

Gradually times changed and the hall fell into disuse. Today, however, an active group of residents is concerned with preserving the structure and putting it back to useful purposes.

Frederick A. Tompson (1857-1919), the architect, experienced a prolific career spanning four decades. Among his works are the Masonic Temple and the Adam P. Leighton House in Portland, and the Walker Memorial Library in Westbrook, all of which are listed on the National Register. Tompson was trained initially in the office of Francis H. Fassett, Maine's most noted mid-19th century architect.
