The Wauneta Roller Mills is located in Wauneta, Nebraska, a community situated in the southwestern portion of the state. Located approximately 280 miles generally southwest of Lincoln, the capital city, the population of Wauneta was 625 in 2000 (US Census). Located along the south end of the community, the Wauneta Roller Mills is situated along the Santa Fe/Burlington Northern Railroad tracks and just a few blocks from U.S. Highway 6. This nomination features three contributing buildings, the Wauneta Roller Mills building, the Maxfield family home and an associated garage/shop building.

Constructed in 1925, the Wauneta Roller Mills has grown organically through the years. The footprint of the building is roughly ell shaped. Covered primarily in galvanized steel, the large industrial structure features several gables. The original mill building, a large two story gambrel roofed barn, is visible along the north side of the ell. A concrete foundation supports the entire structure. A loading dock is present along the south side of the mill. Windows have been kept to a minimum and are found primarily in the gable end of the attic areas. The roof is metal.

A one story stucco building with a mansard roof, added in 1962, is present on the east end of the main mill building. This one story addition houses the current office space. The mill building itself consists of a basement, two milling floors and elevator heads in the attic area. A small lab is located directly off of the office, and the remainder of the interior is taken up by equipment used to process and bag flour as well to produce pellet animal feed. A newer warehouse area is located on the northwest corner of the building.

The roller mill used in current milling operations is the original one installed by Bert Maxfield in 1925. Originally operated by diesel power, it is now powered by 68 electrical motors.

Located directly north of the mill building is a clay tile bungalow constructed by Bert Maxfield in 1929 for his family. This three bedroom house features end gables and a hipped front porch with brick and wood columns. The house was constructed on a concrete foundation and the roof is asphalt shingle. Windows present in this house include three-over-one double-hung windows typical to homes of this period. As with the exterior, the interior of this house retains excellent integrity. This home's woodwork is rich and inviting, and includes built-in glass-fronted cabinets between the living room and the dining room. The floors are currently covered in carpet, but hardwood remains beneath.

Located northwest of the house, the hipped roof garage was constructed sometime prior to the house, and served as the Maxfield home while the bungalow was completed. After serving as a temporary family home, this building did double duty as both a garage and a shop area. Painted white, the garage is clad with wood clapboard siding, has an asphalt shingle roof and a concrete foundation. Rafter ends are exposed and a pair of two-over-two windows is present on the north side of the building. This two-bay garage is accessed on the west side of the building, along an alley.

The physical integrity of this property is good. The mill building has seen physical change related to changing operations of the roller mill. However, the mill retains sufficient integrity to convey its significance as a flour mill, an industry significant in our past. The associated house and garage retain excellent integrity and taken with the flour mill, help to relate the story of flour milling in Wauneta, Nebraska.

The Wauneta Roller Mills is significant at the local level under Criterion A for its association with the industry of grain processing, including flour milling. Playing an important economic roll within the community, the Wauneta Roller Mills has provided an outlet for area grain producers since 1925.

Originally from Canada, Bert Maxfield gained practical milling experience while working at milling operations in Nebraska and in South Dakota. In 1925, four years after Wauneta's water powered mill was destroyed by fire, Maxfield and his wife Edna constructed the modern Wauneta Roller Mills. The Maxfield mill was not water powered, but was instead powered by a diesel engine. When constructed, the mill produced primarily wheat flour, though grain for use as animal feed was also custom ground for area farmers.

While establishing the mill business, the Maxfield's also constructed domestic structures alongside the mill building, including a garage that served as a temporary home while the family home was planned and completed in 1929.

In the 1930's, the mill was converted from diesel power to electrical power. By 1935, the first mechanical feed mixer was installed.<sup>1</sup> Bert and Edna's son Raymond joined the operation around 1939. Sisters Emma Jean and Dorothy followed suit. In 1940, the mill began producing animal feeds in pellet form.<sup>2</sup> During World War II, the Wauneta Roller Mills contracted with the U.S. military, proudly providing three railroad carloads under each contract.

Throughout the mid to late 1940's, local wheat growers produced crops that were low in protein, threatening the quality of Wauneta's Best Flour. Gone were the days in which the only testing done on batches of flour was Edna's baking, and reliance on outside labs in the Midwest equaled delays in flour milling. Raymond made inquiries until he found a university that would agree to teach him how to use equipment to test protein levels on site. Raymond and his family traveled to the University of Lincoln's Agricultural campus in 1947 so that he could learn procedures for protein testing. While Raymond learned all he needed during just a few days, it took nearly two years for them to acquire the necessary testing equipment. After re-teaching himself protein testing techniques, the Wauneta Roller Mills has been testing all wheat on site, saving valuable time while ensuring the quality of Wauneta's Best Flour.

The Wauneta Roller Mills was the third mill operated in Wauneta, a community platted in 1887. While not the earliest mill in the community, the Wauneta Roller mill continued to play the important role of the mill in the local agricultural economy. The Wauneta Roller Mill provided area grain producers with a local outlet for their grain. Most of the wheat used in the flour is grown within a 100 mile radius of Wauneta.<sup>3</sup> In the earliest days of the establishment, producers could choose to sell their grain outright, or could choose to have their grain milled into flour for their own use. Producers who took their grain to the Wauneta Roller Mills for sale then had a ready opportunity to purchase other goods available in the community.

Flour and grain milling played an important economic role throughout Nebraska's history. The first mills in Nebraska were grist mills established in the eastern portion of the state, coinciding with the earliest population centers in the state. At the turn of the century, the number of flour mills in Nebraska peaked, with a total of 260 mills in operation.<sup>4</sup> The turn of the century also brought significant change to the milling industry as small mills closed and operating mills consolidated. By 1925 when Bert Maxfield established the Wauneta Roller Mills, the number of mills in the state had decreased to 110.

Tom Buecker attributes the decline of the small mill in Nebraska to three factors: 1) market demand for uniform flour; 2) large scale production and purchasing capabilities of large mills; 3) excessive costs of updating equipment.<sup>5</sup> The Wauneta Roller Mills business model went against each of these factors. Most of the wheat used at the Wauneta Roller Mills was grown within a 100 mile radius of Wauneta. Onsite management and testing insured a product that was both consistent and of high quality. The Maxfield family did not move toward large scale production. Rather, they continually produced excellent products while providing individualized service. Bert Maxfield's choice to diversify his operation to include processing grain for animal feed was an industry-wide trend in Nebraska and helped to insure that the Wauneta Roller Mills remained in operation. Finally, the Maxfield family did not choose to invest in costly new equipment. Rather, in the tried and true method of resourceful Nebraskans they have continued to repair original equipment. These factors, taken together with a strong family work ethic, secured the economic viability and the economic importance of the Wauneta Roller Mills.

The Wauneta Roller Mills is eligible at the local level under Criterion A for its association with the industry of flour and grain milling in Nebraska. Throughout its history, the Wauneta Roller Mills has played a significant role in the agricultural industry and the economy of the local area.
