#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Lawrence was built around 1840 of frame, possibly incorporating an earlier house in its south wing.

The main block of the house, with its gabled end facing the street, is marked by four square columns, which support a plain pediment. Under the portico is a three-bay facade. On the first floor, two windows and a door, each better than ten feet high, light the hallway and front parlor. Smaller windows above light the master bedroom. To the north is a small office wing, also colonnaded in imitation of the main portico. The south wing, which is the front of the service module, has a simpler front porch. The kitchen, dining room, and other service rooms are in the south wing, which extends to the rear as an ell. On the back, a large porch extends around the main house and the service wing inside the arms of the ell.

Small windows for a third story under the roof of the main block are found on the sides. Original shutters survive on most of the openings.

One enters the main house through a side hall in the main block. To the left are the two parlors; to the right is a door to the office wing porch. The back door of the hallway opens into the back porch. A staircase occupies the back of the hallway.

Between the two parlors is a sliding door, possibly an addition.

The slate mantels in the parlors have been painted to match the woodwork, but they have not been altered. Wooden mantels elsewhere in the house are quite simple, but entirely original.

The interior trim in the house is classic in detail, and severely plain. No corner blocks are employed in the windows or doors, and even the simple Greek ogee is used sparingly.

Hardware in the house represents an inventory of the finest materials available during the period. The closet door locks are small, carpenter-type latches without keyholes or bolts. The main door locks are iron rimblocks with retracting bolts. Brass knobs survive throughout. Downstairs are nineteenthcentury mortise locks with elaborate filigree patterns that may have been an early addition. Since these mortise locks all match, even in the sliding doors, they may have been added at one time.

The house is set in a landscaped park in an agricultural area a few miles north of Seaford.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

BUILDER/ARCHITECT

#### Lawrence is a nearly-complete surviving example of the classic period in American domestic architecture. Details, including hardware, flooring, trim, and landscaping, survive throughout the house and grounds.

The temple form was unusual in Delaware, even for public buildings. In domestic structures, few temple fronts were built and fewer survive. Because this building radically departs in nearly every detail from the vernacular architecture then prevalent in the area, it probably was the product of an outside designer.

Nearly all the details of the trim have survived intact. Aside from electrification, heating, plumbing, and new concrete porch decks, alterations have been negligible.

Lawrence was built by Charles Wright, the youngest son of Joshua Wright of Dorcester County Maryland. A shipper and trader, Charles came to Seaford at the height of its prosperity. He built Lawrence for his second wife, Eliza Ann Mastin, whom he married in 1839.
