DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Cloudcroft Railroad Trestle, also known as the Mexican Canyon Trestle, is located approximately one-half mile northwest of Cloudcroft, New Mexico. The structure is visible from a point on U.S. Highway 82 where a historical marker gives a brief description of "The Cloud Climbing Railroad." It is the most prominent remaining structure of the Alamogordo and Sacramento Mountain Railway which operated under various names from 1899 to 1947.

Built in 1899, the curved trestle has an overall length of 323 feet and rises 52 feet above the canyon floor. Vertical supports spaced 15 feet apart consist of 12" x 12" timbers. The rails (removed in 1948) and crossties were placed on 8"x16" stringers held together with three-quarter-inch bolts and cast iron spacers. In order to form the curve, the top part was built in 21 sections with 8"x16" timbers. There are 10 main timbers 15 feet in length in each of the 21 sections resting on footing blocks set 4 to 8 feet underground. Lateral, longitudinal, and diagonal wooden braces prevented sway and shifting of the trestle. A wooden guard rail ran along the track to keep the ties from bunching. Metal guard rails running outside the standard gauge rails prevented derailed trains from falling off the trestle.

This structure was one of 58 trestles built on the mountainous 32-mile route which also required a switchback and numerous sharp curves. After the route was abandoned in 1947, the rails were taken up and salvagers removed a few of the timbers. The trestle is still essentially intact, however, and is a striking feature of the landscape near Cloudcroft.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Cloudcroft Railroad Trestle, located in Mexican Canyon approximately one-half mile northwest of Cloudcroft, is the most prominent remaining structure of the Alamogordo and Sacramento Mountain Railway. The railway, built 1898-1903, was a branch of Charles B. Eddy's El Paso and Northeastern Railway which was sold to the El Paso and Southwestern Railway, a system acquired by the Southern Pacific Railroad Company in 1924.

According to David Myrick's historical survey, <u>New Mexico's Railroads</u>, the railway known as the "cloud-climbing railroad" was one of the most spectacular in the west. The route began at Alamogordo, elevation 4,322 feet, and climbed a distance of 32 miles to Russia, elevation 9,069 feet. The mountainous route was designed by Horace A. Sumner who also laid out a number of mountain railroads in Colorado. It involved ruling grades of 6.4%, a switchback, and 58 trestles averaging 120 feet in length. Several of the trestles in various states of repair can still be found along the route including the trestle at Mexican Canyon near Cloudcroft.

The railroad served two main puposes: hauling timber from the Sacramento Mountains for the Alamogordo Lumber Company and carrying excursion trains from Alamogordo to the Cloudcroft Lodge and mountain resort cabins largely patronized by tourists from El Paso. The timber shipments were essential to the construction of the El Paso and Northeastern line from Alamogordo to Carrizozo, or, as Dorothy Neal states in The Cloud-Climbing Railroad, Charles Eddy "built a railroad to build a railroad." The excursion trains ran until 1930 and limited passenger service continued until 1938. The lumber company's shift to the use of motor trucks caused the end of the freight service in 1947. The rails were removed in 1948.

Many of the railroad structures were sold and salvaged for lumber, but several trestles remain, the most prominent of which is the one nearest Cloudcroft. It has become a trademark of the mountain resort area and in 1970 the New Mexico State Highway Department placed a historical marker beside U.S. Highway 82 overlooking the structure. The landmark was considered sufficiently important to local tourist industry that the Cloudcroft Chamber of Commerce and the Cloudcroft Motel-Hotel Association prepared the nomination which led to its listing in the New Mexico State Register of Cultural Properties. The eightyyear-old structure is an attractive reminder of the Alamogordo and Sacramento Mountain Railway, a remarkable engineering feat which led to the development of the Cloudcroft area and provided lumber needed for the expansion of the El Paso and Northeastern Railway.
