Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Wheeler-Chism & Way House is a two story, wood frame structure built in 1890 in the Capitol Park area of Tuscaloosa. It contains the irregularity of plan and massing of the Queen Anne style, but not the variety of textures and materials. Located on a shady corner lot in a middle class neighborhood of frame residences built between 1890 and 1920, it is one of the finest houses in the area.

Crowned with a balustraded deck on a high hip roof, gabled bays with pents project at the northwest and southwest corners and from the central sections of the east and west sides. The projecting bays on the northwest corner and east side are beveled and contain windows on the end and beveled corners. A one story hip roofed porch wraps around the east and north sides terminating against the projecting northwest bay. The porch is supported by slender Tuscan columns that rest on brick pedestals. Entrance is through the single front door on the north side, which has side lights and a transom, or the single door with transom on the east side. A new rear door with side lights is located in the shed roofed addition at the southeast corner.

The interior retains its original dark stained woodwork which consists of post and lintel door and window facings, picture moldings, doors, and baseboards. The staircase which ascends from the front left of the hallway and three mirrored overmantles are also darkly stained. The mantels all have Tuscan columns supporting the shelf and a decorative solid iron grate surrounded by blue and white mottled tile. All windows have one over one lights.

Care was taken to retain the architectural integrity of the structure when it was recently restored by the present owners as offices. Changes to the structure were minimal and basically include only the installation of modern necessities. A contemporary hip with gable roofed garage and storage building is located behind the house.

## Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Constructed in 1890 as the home of M. J. Wheeler, a prominent brick manufacturer, this is one of the finest houses in the Capitol Park area of Tuscaloosa and one of the first structures to have been built in the city after a long period of depression. With its multi-gabled projecting bays and encircling Tuscan columned porch it was typical of the type of buildings which would be constructed in this section of town between 1890 and 1920.

The Capitol Park area, developed as a middle class residential neighborhood during this period, was proposed as a district in 1976. Intense opposition to the district resulted in the recall of the nomination and it seems unlikely that it will be forwarded to Washington in the near future. The current owners of the building have renovated it for office use and local sponsors of the nomination hope that it will serve as an inspiration for other restorations in the area.
