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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Widow Towne-Akenson House, built in 1875, is located on the south side of West Third Street between Pine and Cedar Streets. The house is situated towards the back of its lot with a large nicely landscaped front yard. It is near the western side of Red Wing's Historic Residential District among many other large early residences of similar scale.

The two story house of wood frame construction has a characteristic Italianate three bay front with a side hall. A significant degree of the original design integrity has been retained. The plan is irregular with a wrap-around porch on two sides supported by paired columns. The windows are double hung, two over two, and the front door is framed by leaded glass side-lights. A small porthole window is set in the broken pediment on the Third Street side. The house is capped with a bracketted cornice beneath the deeply overhanging hipped roof.

The only addition appears to be a frame section to the rear of the building which does not detract significantly from the building's outstanding integrity. Stylistically the addition matches the house's only outbuilding, a two story garage - carriage house located in back of the house very close to the alley. Both the addition and the garage also show Italianate detail and were probably built shortly after the main building.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Widow Towne-Akenson House is significant as Red Wing's outstanding frame Italianate house. It retains a significant degree of original design integrity and exhibits architectural detail characteristic of the Italianate style in residential architecture. The number of substantial Italianate houses in Red Wing is striking for a town of its size. Most of these houses were built during the 1870s and are indicative of the remarkable commercial growth the city experienced at that time. The Widow Towne-Akenson House is worthy of preservation because it is the best preserved example in frame construction of a style that was very popular in Red Wing during the 1870s.

City records indicate that this house was built by Fannie Towne, a widow, around 1875. She sold the house to Nels Akenson in 1894. The house is best known locally for its association with its second owner. Nels Akenson lived there for some fifty years. He owned a grocery store in Red Wing and was active in local affairs.

The Widow Towne-Akenson House is significant as Red Wing's best preserved frame Italianate house associated with an era of Red Wing's history of tremendous prosperity and local pride.
