Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Stone-Reid House is a one-story, wood-frame mid-nineteenth-century vernacular cottage with a "picturesque" porch. It faces northward onto West Eastport Street. The house was originally composed as a symmetrical, side-gabled main block, one room deep, containing two rooms and a central hall, behind which was a two-room rear ell and a detached kitchen. Over the years additions to the rear of the house have converted it to a deep rectangular form and the former kitchen building has been connected to the house as a wing projecting from the west rear corner. The original main block has exterior end chimneys. Other exterior chimneys are located at the rear of the original ell and on the west side of the house beyond the west gable-end chimney. There are interior chimneys in the center of the original ell and in the former kitchen building. The house sits upon brick piers with a later brick infill. The exterior walls are clad in weatherboards, except within the porch, where the wall surface is flush boards.

The façade of the house is consists of a three-bay central porch with a 6-over-6 double-hung window on either side. There are simple pilasters at the front corners, supporting a modest, plain frieze and cornice. The porch is supported by pairs and triplets of slender square posts with simple capitals, linked by slender, curved wooden strips forming shallow segmental arches. Within the porch is a double-leaf door surmounted by a 6-light rectangular transom in a plain surround.

Much of the original interior remains, although one room has been given wood paneling and has had its ceiling lowered in recent years. In other rooms the original plaster and some of the woodwork survives, including several simple wooden mantelpieces.

Despite its alterations, the Stone-Reid House retains much of its historic appearance and remains an important example of the antebellum architecture of Iuka.

The nominated property also includes one early, contributing outbuilding (believed to have been a smokehouse) and a later, noncontributing garage.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Stone-Reid House is locally significant architecturally and historically because, despite its alterations, it is one of a very small number of buildings in the town of Iuka that survive from the early settlement period (see cover documentation for the Historic Resources of Iuka). The house is believed to have been built about 1858.

This house is one of three antebellum cottages in Iuka that have picturesque detailing on their porches instead of the vernacular Greek Revival styling more typical of the surviving antebellum houses of the area. (The other picturesque cottages are the Reid House at 702 West Eastport and the Coman House at 202 East Quitman.) This house is also notable as the only small antebellum cottage in Iuka to retain its kitchen building, even though it is now attached to the house.

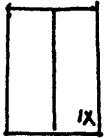

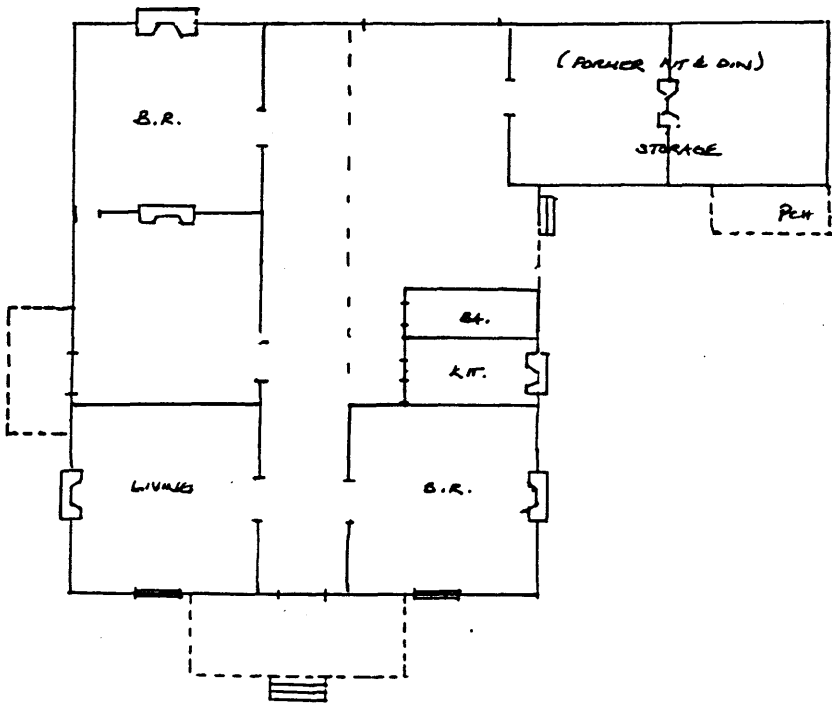
