Historic Resources of Pewee Valley MPL Pewee Valley Confederate Cemetery

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#### Description

The Pewee Valley Confederate Cemetery (OL-370) occupies a small portion of the Pewee Valley Cemetery located just outside the Pewee Valley city limits on Maple Avenue southwest of that street's intersection with Old Floydsburg Road. The site is within the area of the Historic Resources of Pewee Valley Multiple Property Listing. The Confederate Cemetery, laid out in 1904, is a 115 foot by 164 foot plot near the northeast corner of the main cemetery. It contains the remains of 313 Confederate veterans, most of whom were residents of the Kentucky Confederate Home located in Pewee Valley. Simple marble markers arranged in straight rows and dating from 1903 to 1930 mark the graves, and a historic low concrete retaining wall (a contributing structure) surrounds the plot. The southwest corner of the plot is curved to conform to the main cemetery drive which passes just by it. A single row of alternating cedar and dogwood trees, probably planted when the plot was laid out, is located just inside the retaining wall on both the north and south sides. A sign reading "Kentucky Confederate Home, Dedicated October 23, 1902" is centrally located just outside the west end of the enclosure. The sign, arranged on an arch created from wire mesh and supported by metal poles, was erected in the 1950s. Immediately to the north of the sign, also just outside the enclosure, is a Confederate memorial (a contributing object) that reads "Erected by Biscoe Hindman, June 1904. In memory of our Confederate dead." The monument, located on a small mound of earth, consists of a cast metal obelisk and base that sits on a larger stone base. Nearby is a non-historic metal plaque on a raised stand that gives a brief history of the Kentucky Confederate Home. This was erected by the United Daughters of the Confederacy. Both the Confederate Cemetery plot and a 70 foot by 30 foot area to the west containing the memorial monument, the non-historic sign and the UDC plaque are included in the nomination. No significant alterations have been made to the Confederate cemetery. It has slipped into disrepair several times in its history, but since the late 1950s has been fairly well maintained with the assistance of inmates from the State Reformatory in La Grange.

The remainder of the cemetery, which was laid out in 1871, consists of a mixture of modest historic and non-historic grave markers organized around a gravel road that loops through the grounds. Historic shade trees and shrubbery dot the site. Much of the cemetery has never been developed. Non-historic brick gates surmounted by an arched metalwork sign with the name "Pewee Valley Cemetery" mark the entrance, and a white-painted wood board fence runs along Maple Avenue at its north edge. Across the road to the north side of Maple Avenue is the historic black cemetery which is even more sparsely developed.

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#### Statement of Significance

The Pewee Valley Confederate Cemetery (OL-370) is an important Pewee Valley site individually nominated as part of the Historic Resources of Pewee Valley Multiple Property Listing. The cemetery is eligible for the National Register under Criterion A and Criterion Consideration D and is significant in terms of Military History. Its period of significance dates from 1904 when it was established and laid out and the memorial monument was erected to 1930 when interments in the plot ceased.

The Confederate Cemetery was established in 1904 by directors of the Kentucky Confederate Home to provide a place of burial for Confederate veterans who had been its residents. There are 313 veterans buried in the cemetery. The Home, located in the center of Pewee Valley in what had been the old Villa Ridge Inn, was established in 1902 to provide a resident facility for these homeless veterans. Established with funds collected by Southern sympathizers in the state and furnished by the Kentucky division of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, it was turned over to the Commonwealth of Kentucky in 1902 and run by the state until it was closed in 1934. The main building, the old Villa Ridge Hotel, burned in 1920, but the home continued in ancillary buildings until 1934 when only seven veterans remained. At this time the home was closed, and the few remaining men were moved to other locations.

The Confederate Cemetery is significant as the only intact remaining building or site in Pewee Valley associated with the Kentucky Confederate Home which played such an important role in the community during the early 1900s. In terms of Military History it is significant for documenting the Confederate legacy of the Civil War in a border state where both northern and southern interests were strongly represented. The Confederate Home was the only state supported institution for Confederate veterans in Kentucky, and the cemetery is one of the few burial grounds in the state specifically set aside for the burial of Confederate veterans. It is the only Civil War-related military site in Oldham County. Its eligibility in terms of Criterion Consideration D is determined by its important association with the Kentucky Confederate Home in Pewee Valley and by its significance in the area of military history.

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
