DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The 2 and 1/2 story house has a rectangular plan of approximately 60 feet by 26 feet, the western 2/3 of which dates from 1738. This section is bisected into two rooms by an off center alcove with stair behind. This condition is roughly repeated on the second and third stories. The eastern portion, which dates from the late 1760's has a slightly higher cornice line. It has a side hall plan, with the hall running parallel to the long (north) side of the house. Aside from the hall, there is one major room on each floor. The hall contains a quarter circle winding staircase.

The east, north, and south sides of the house have porches, none of which are original. The old western portion has weather boarding with 9 over 6 sash windows. The eastern addition has flush beaded weather boards of irregular width, with 9 over 9 sash windows. Much of the original glass remains, as does much of the original hardware and wainscoting. There are 6 fireplaces, 2 of which are of the corner type. The fireplace on the ground floor of the addition is framed in fine raised paneling.

When first built, the house faced King's Highway (north side). However, when High Street was cut through, the main entry and address was moved to eastern end of the house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Smith-Cadbury Mansion is associated with two families of local prominance. The Smith family, which owned the house from 1766 to 1798, were involved in the retreat of the British forces from Philadelphia in 1778. Also during the Revolution, the house received an overnight visit from Lafayette.

The Harris', who are credited with helping to establish 3 Protestant sects in Moorestown (Baptist, Episcopal, and Methodist), bought the house in 1798. Edward Harris, Jr., allowed early meeting of the aforementioned sects in the mansion, and latter donated land to each, for the purpose of church construction.

The mansion is one of the earliest frame houses of weather board exterior in Moorestown. Much of the original hardware, wainscoting, and glass remains. Moreover the house represents a regional country residence type, which is considerably above average in terms of size and opulence of detailing.

Although owners antedating the Smiths and Harrises took part in Moorestown activities and civil organization (Joshua Humphries and Nehemiah Haines), they were not recorded as "prominent" in the sense that the Smiths and Harrises were. Samuel Smith was an historian who bought the property for his son Richard. The farm contained 160 acres at that time. Richard inherited the property in 1775 and resided upon it until his death in 1796. Richard was active in local affairs and held offices of Freeholder and Township Committee for several terms. As an influential property owner who possessed one of the largest homes in the area, Richard Smith entertained many important political and military personages. (2,3)

During the American Revolution, the German General VonKnyphausen made the mansion and property his headquarters during the night of June 19, 1778. His Hessian troops were part of the retreating British Army leaving Philadelphia. Letters exist which the General wrote for Joseph Roberts to regain possession of his horses, stolen by the troops. Since the soldiers had no manners and were rough, the ladies were order locked in their upstairs rooms. A young niece of Mr. Smith (Elizabeth Murrell) precipitated an "incident" by trying to transfer to another room, and was accosted by a soldier -- rescued by her screams.
