

Narrative Description

The Coal Creek Cabin is an example of some three dozen backcountry patrol cabins erected throughout Glacier National Park's wilderness in the 1920's and 1930's. It is a single-level structure constructed of saddle-notched logs with pole chinking. A log-framed gable roof extends to shelter a large log-framed front porch. The roof surface was originally covered with logs; This was replaced with shingles and later by metal. There are two wood-framed windows, both shuttered, as well as an entry door located built of vertical wood members braced diagonally. The interior contains a single room with a board floor, unfinished walls and no ceiling; There is a small cellar food cache.

Rehabilitation efforts in the fall of 1998 have replaced the metal roof with a cedar shingle surface, and have replaced deteriorated log ends and purln ends.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The Coal Creek Snowshoe Cabin is an example of some three dozen backcountry patrol cabins erected throughout the Park's wilderness largely during the 1920's. The structure typifies the design of such cabins; its log walls and framing combine with its thought-out rustic design to make the Coal Creek Cabin highly appropriate for it's natural setting. The structure possesses good structural integrity. It was constructed as an overnight stopping place for rangers on backcountry patrol, winter and summer; it has retained a similar pattern of historic use for over seventy years, reflecting National Park Service resource protection philosophies and activities throughout most of the Twentieth Century.

There is little documentary evidence concerning the construction of the Coal Creek Cabin. Park records indicate that the cabin was erected in 1925, probably under private contract, in conjunction with several other cabins. The building received immediate, regular use as an overnight stopping spot in backcountry patrols conducted by rangers from both the Nyack and Paola Ranger Stations.

In its early years the cabin displayed a striking architectural feature unique within the park: an outer roof surface of peeled logs, laid in continuous vertical rows and topped with a notched log running the length of the ridge. The added weight was supported by a series of double purlins, one log placed atop the other. This configuration was an apparent attempt to protect the cabin from deadfalls. The Coal Creek Cabin had received a more "standard" shingle roof by the 1940's, to be replaced by metal in the 1960's, and a current rehabilitation effort is replacing the metal roof with a cedar shingle surface. Other than the roof, the cabin retains good historic integrity of appearance and fabric.

Use of the cabin has declined over the years reflecting the lessened NPS administrative presence in the Middle Fork area. The Paola Ranger Station was abandoned in 1932, and the Nyack station has been closed as well. The cabin is still an overnight stop in backcountry patrols in the area however, and is used to house trail crew members when they are working in the area. It continues to serve a role in the park's management of this area.
