

18. Description This house is a two-story, asymmetrical, painted, brick structure with a square tower. The extended eaves are supported by pairs of brackets. The fenestration combines the use of the round arch and the segmental arch. A wing has been added to the house and the front porch remodeled although some of the original iron work remains. 9. History This residence was built about 1858 by Samuel Nock who had originally bought a house on this site from Mr. Hobbs. That house burned. In 1910 Mr. & Mrs. J.P. Gray bought it and renamed it "Graytower." This was the period when Anchorage was popular as a summer resort and Graytower became a boarding house. Eventually it was a boarding house year round. 20. Significance Graytower is significant architecturally as a prime example of the Italian Villa. It has had only minor alterations over the years.
