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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Constructed in 1914-1915 to replace the earlier 1882 frame church, St. Peter's Church in Gentilly is an excellent example of brick Neo-Gothic architecture. The church is executed on a rectangular, central-aisle plan with an apsidal projection at the rear. The roof is in the form of a simple gable.

The front, or principal facade, is highly articulated in terms of architectural detailing. It is symmetrical in arrangement with a central entry incorporated within the base of a prominent tower and flanked by two lancet windows with quatrefoil tracery. This tracery is repeated in the central tower window with its double-tier tripartite stained glass panels surmounted by a large quatrefoil in the arch. Engaged buttresses are situated at the corners of the central tower and at the corner tourelles; the buttresses also define the four longitudinal bays at the sides of the church. The tower is crowned by an octagonal belfry and an octagonal spire. Gable and eave detailing is in the form of low-relief corbells.

The interior of the church is embellished with elaborately stencilled patterns and frescoes executed in shades of blue, crimson, beige, green and gold. The apse end of the sanctuary is the setting for the elaborately carved Gothic-style high altar and two side altars. Stained glass windows donated to the church as memorials to former parishioners depict Biblical subjects.

The adjacent rectory is a two story frame residence constructed in 1902. It is essentially cubiform in plan and is covered with a low, truncated hip roof. The principal facade is symmetrical with a one story full-front porch. The porch has paired Doric columns and a spindle-work balustrade.

Both the church and rectory are well maintained in an excellent state of preservation; they continue to serve original functions.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

St. Peter's Church and Rectory is significant as a well-preserved example of Neo-Gothic Church architecture and as an important reminder of the efforts of French Canadians to establish a parish which reflects a strong sense of national heritage and community. Through the 1840s and 1870s, large numbers of French Canadians made their way to the principal Minnesota metropolitan areas of Mendota, St. Paul, and St. Anthony. Following the influx of settlers who progressively moved north and westward as Minnesota territory was opened to settlement, many of these French Canadians made their way into the Red River Valley. By 1880, the Great Northern and Northern Pacific Railroads had reached Polk County and promotional materials prepared by alreadyestablished French Canadians appealed to other French Canadians to settle in the new French-speaking communities. Distinguishing these communities from other Minnesota frontier settlements and appealing to French Canadians as an ethnic group in particular was the inter-relationship that existed between parish and community. For Catholic French Canadians, this socio-ecclesiastical structure was the essential factor in preserving group identity. This cultural pattern is evident in St. Peter's Catholic Church in Gentilly, whose congregation, organized in 1879, numbered 118 French Canadian families and only two Irish families. The trials of settlement, disease, bad weather and subsequent crop failures had their effect on the early members of St. Peter's and some began to leave. In 1881, to counteract this, Reverend Alexandre Bouchard established a governing unit fashioned after the national parish system in French Canada, in which the working roles of the priest, parish council, and parishioners are defined. Reverend Bouchard's system was effective, the parish was saved from fragmentation, and shortly thereafter the first rectory and church were constructed. In 1888 Reverend Elie Theillon was transferred to the parish and found the community still 'agriculturally depressed. Seizing the initiative and utilizing the church-community structure already in place, Reverend Theillon sought to improve the agricultural conditions of the area. In a region heavily dependent on wheat, he campaigned to introduce diversified farming practices, resulting in the founding of the Gentilly Dairy Association in 1895. The cheese factory, whose cheese products won national acclaim, operated until its sale to Land O'Lakes in 1933; dividend payments to farmers continued until 1968. When not personally endorsing the sale of Gentilly Cheese, Reverend Theillon oversaw the construction of the present church building, in 1915. Under the leadership of Reverend Theillon and subsequent French Canadian priests, the homogeneity of St. Peter's Parish has remained. The creation of a commercially profit-making venture, the diversification of agriculture, and the creation of social-religious institutions and organizations have fostered a strong sense of heritage in Gentilly. St. Peter's Church and Rectory stands as the pivotal reminder of the common French Canadian nationality and faith of the community.

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
