Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Constructed in 1926, the Casa Caprona (briefly known as the Markert Apartments) is a two-story, sixteen-unit investor owned apartment building designed in the Mediterranean Revival style. The U-shaped building has overall dimensions of 117 by 235 feet and is of frame and stucco construction. The building retains its original clay barrel tile roof casement and double hung windows and wrought iron exterior lamps. Located immediately to the north of the building isa 1927 monument commemorating the nearby ante-bellum Capron Trail errected by the Daughters of the Amercian Revolution. The building stands in stark contrast to its surrounding neighborhood, primarily post World War II single family homes.

The Casa Caprona is of heart of pine construction with a veneer of stucco laid over a layer of pine diagonal sheathing and wire mesh. The gable roof of the building retains its original clay Ludowici barrel tiles laid over 90-pound slate paper and pine decking. The roof is punctuated by eight stucco over brick chimneys located on the courtyard slope of the roof. The footing is of poured concrete. Fenestration is double hung sash and casements of wood construction. The building has four, two-story porches covered with a clay tile shed roof supported by turned columns. Each of the porches has a small fountain with a bas relief sculpture.

Each of the building's apartments are approximately 1,750 square feet in area. Four apartments, two per story, are contained in the projecting wings of the building; the remainder in their connecting axis. Each apartment contains a living room of 15 by 20 feet, a sunroom and dining room of comparable dimensions, a 13 by 15 foot bedroom, bath, kitchen, hallway and six closets. Original interior walls and ceilings are plaster although about half of the apartments have been panelled. Floors are mixed hardwood over an oak subfloor. Windows are both casement and conventional double hung sash. Each apartment also has a brick fireplace with a keystone facing. Doors are wood with brass hardware. Two of the apartments have had relatively minor alterations in plan (removal of closets and kitchen and bath enlargements) but the other fourteen remain intact.

The fully landscaped grounds of the apartment include extensive shrubbery, citrus, Washingtonian, Queen Palms and other tropical vegetation. Immediately to the north of the semi-circular driveway of the building is a small county park containing a 1927 monument commemorating the ante-bellum Capron Trail, a major supply route during the Seminole Wars. The park also contains an impressive line of Washingtonian palms and five wrought iron lamp posts.

The building has undergone no major exterior alteraions although several minor cosmetic changes have been made. Screening has been added to six porch balconies and the original tongue and groove planking for three of the back porches has been replaced. Sixteen of the individual apartments' porch columns have been replaced sensitively with modern replicates painted to conform to the color of the originals. More recently, the building has been steam cleaned and repainted and its damaged or deteriorated roof tiles replaced with similar Ludowici tiles.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

1926

The Casa Caprona is significant as a notable example of Mediterranean Revival architecture and through its association with the planned development of San Lucie Plaza. Typical of the grandiose dreams of the Florida Land Boom of the 1920s, the Casa was envisioned as the centerpiece of the proposed winter community of San Lucie Plaza. The development failed, but the Casa remains as a monument to a colorful and significant era in Florida history. During the 1930s, under the ownership of Crayola heiress Dorothy Binney Palmer, the Casa played a major role in the cultural life of Ft. Pierce. The building also housed the families of officers engaged in the then-pioneer underwater demolition training on nearby Hutchinson Island during World War II.

The Casa Caprona, known briefly as the Markert Apartments, was completed in 1926 at a cost of \$125,000. The building was designed in the then-popular Mediterranean Revival style by Elmira, New York architect Arthur Beck as the focal point of the planned San Lucie Plaza development. The Ft. Pierce News-Tribune of October 22, 1926 recorded:

"The Markert Apartments are built along extremely modern lines, although the architecture smacks of Spanish beauty of other decades...It was the idea of the architect, Arthur Beck, to plan each apartment so that it would represent a bungalow. This is provided by the extreme privacy of each apartment, made possible by the special construction and providing eight separate entrances, or one to every two apartments."1

At the time of the Casa's construction, Ft. Pierce was an agricultural shipping center of modest porportions. Citrus groves had only recently replaced the turn-of-thecentury pineapple crops. Cattle ranching, a mainstay of the area's later economy, was in its infancy. In 1925, the Ft. Pierce Chamber of Commerce announced the proposed development of San Lucie Plaza. The Plaza was intended to offer some 6,000 lots for purchase along Capron Trail Boulevard (presently 25th Street) which was to connect Ft. Pierce and Indrio, another proposed land development.

With the collapse of the Florida Land Boom in the late 1920s, none of the grandoise plans for the San Lucie Plaza came to pass, save for the platting and dedication of a few streets. However, the Casa itself was built and quickly became the cultural and social center of Ft. Pierce, especially following its purchase by Alice Binney of Binney Crayola in 1928. Binney renamed the complex Casa Caprona after the nearby site of Fort Capron, established in 1850 as a U.S. Army outpost to protect early settlers from the Seminole Indians. Under Binney and her daughter, Dorothy Binney Palmer, the Casa began to attract more artistic tenants. Recalls landscape artist and long time Ft. Pierce resident A.E. "Bean" Backus:

> "Not only was Casa Caprona a showplace, most of the people who lived here were people with great artist appreciation. People like Dorothy Binney Palmer and Betsy Tyler who brought the Metropolitan Opera stars here."³ 10 CON STO

During World War II, the Casa housed the officers of the Navy's top secret underwater demolition program on Hutchinson Island. Originally known as the Naval Combat Demolition Training program, the Underwater Demolition Training program was initiated at
