DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The building is a handsome two-story brick, Italianate Victorian, 100 ft. x 45 ft., situated in the central part of town across from the City Hall and County Courthouse. The two street sides of the building are divided into bays approximately ô ft. wide by ornamental cast iron columns' (or buttresses) each bearing the legend "Union Iron Works, Sacramento, 1882" in raised letters at the base. The second floor is reserved exclusively for Odd Fellows functions. The first floor is divided into several sections and rented to local businesses. This has been the pattern of use of the building since its completion in 1883.

The building was designed by architect A. A. Cook of Sacramento (who also designed the still-standing 1886 Cone & Kimball "clock tower" building in Red Bluff). It was constructed by Swain & Hudson (contractors) of Marysville, who were also building the Tehama County Hall of Records (across the street) about the same time.

The street sides of the building have a stucco veneer over the bricks. The second floor has a 20-foot ceiling that has been "lowered" in the dining area but is full height in the main meeting room (which has stamped metal coverings on the ceiling and walls and old-style ceiling fans). The outside walls are 16" thick and partition walls are 12" thick. Interior construction is of wood. The building has a flat roof and no basement.

A fire in May of 1903 resulted in considerable damage to the interior of the building. Reconstruction was completed in February, 1904, in accordance with the original plans. Except for this and a fire escape which was added in the courtyard area in 1975, there appear to have been no significant alterations to the building since its original construction.

This building is a very fine example of its type of Victorian architecture, of which there used to be many examples but in recent years has been becoming increasingly rare in California. It is a well-proportioned brick and stucco building, with Italianate features and employing cast iron (as previously mentioned), and with a canopy over the sidewalk on the two street sides supported by fluted wooden stanchions. The canopy has been a feature of the building since its original construction, and was for the purpose of minimizing the effect of the hot summer sun (as was also the purpose of the previously-mentioned 20-ft. ceilings). The building's plan is very practical in that it serves the purposes of the original owner (which are non-commercial) and at the same time generates income for the owner from the businesses on the first floor.

The building was erected in 1832-83 by the present owner, I.O.C.F. Lodge #76, which is one of the oldest I.O.O.F. lodges in northern California (as two of the three lodges which assisted in the Red Bluff lodge chartering in 1858 were from communities which have since become ghost towns). Contemporary newspaper accounts of the dedication (Monday, March 26, 1883) indicate that the dedication was attended by several hundred people, including 200 who came on a special train from Chico. The occasion was marked by parades (in between rainstorms) after the dedication ceremony itself, choral renditions by the Handel & Haydn Society, a midnight supper at the new Odd Fellows Hall, and an all-night party and grand ball which was attended by so many people that it was necessary to rent the Masonic Hall and arrange with one of the bands from Chico to play there. That the dedication was quite a local event is also indicated by the fact that the names of several of the lodge officials also appear frequently in contemporary newspaper advertisements and articles. They seem to have been prominent citizens of Red Bluf:

The building can be considered to be significant to the community in that its owner, the I.C.C.F., has always been active in community affairs, both individually and collectively. The lodge established the first cemetery in Red Bluff, and it still has a voice in administering it, although the major part of the administration has been taken over by the local city government. The lodge also built a city park and the first city bandstand, helped to build a local library, and today supports local historic preservation projects (among other things).

The building is the fourth quarters of the lodge since its founding. Businesses on the ground floor at various times have included a marble works, F.G.&E. office, real estate offices, and the offices of the Sentinel (an early Red Bluff newspaper from whose files some of this material has been obtained). The building today looks hardly changed at all from an early picture of it which may be seen at a local restored Victorian house (the Kelly-Griggs Museum).

One of the large local industries of that day, the Sierra Flume and Lumber Co., had a 35-mile long flume by which logs were conveyed from the lumber camps in the Sierra foothills to the Sacramento River. While it was against company rules to use the flume for personal transportation (except in emergencies), present-day lodge members say that some members of that time used the flume regularly to get to lodge meetings in Red Bluff.
