DESCRIPTION

The Wiley schoolhouse was constructed in 1938 by the Works Progress Administration (WPA) program. The one-story, flat-roofed building measures approximately seventy by seventy feet and is finished on the exterior with uncoursed sandstone slabs. The building fronts east onto Main Street on the east side of the Wiley School property, a complex of newer school buildings. The entire east boundary of the block is defined by a sandstone curb approximately 1.5 ft. high, also constructed by the WPA. Three wide sandstone steps lead from the street up to the sidewalk. These steps were designed to be loading piers for the school buses. The west side of the block contains the present Wiley Consolidated School District RE-13-JT buildings that house the elementary through high school classrooms, offices, gymnasium, and auditorium. The elementary playground surrounds the rock schoolhouse.

The symmetrical school facade contains a centered double door sheltered beneath a shed-roofed awning supported by curving corner brackets. The one-step concrete stoop is flanked by stone half-walls. Two sets of paired eight-over-eight, double-hung wood frame windows flank each side of the entry. A belt course wraps the building and forms the flat window arches. The arches and sills are formed of narrow tan sandstone blocks laid much like a brick rowlock. The blocks become progressively thinner in width from the center to the outer edges of each window bay. The parapet is steeped gently toward the center and is capped by flat sandstone slabs. A terra cotta WPA memorial plaque is bolted to the wall at the north corner.

The south elevation contains four evenly-spaced bays identical to those on the facade. The parapet steps down along the elevation from front to rear (east to west). A rear extension contains a single four-over-four window.

The north elevation contains four bays identical to the facade and an additional three six-over-nine windows along the western-most portion of the elevation. The parapet steps down to the rear (west.)

The west elevation consists of three sections which step back from north to south. The northern- and southern-most sections are faced with the same sandstone veneer as the rest of the building. The center section is composed of concrete block, stuccoed and painted white. Fenestration consists of a vehicular door in the northern section, a wood double door in the center, and a single and a paired six-over-six window in the southern section.

The sandstone veneer was locally quarried by the WPA workers. The inner walls are of ornamental concrete block recycled from another Wiley structure, the Theater and Equity Building.

The schoolhouse interior consists of four large classrooms with a central hallway, two bathrooms and a storage garage. Each classroom boasts large, multi-paned windows on all exterior walls. All the classrooms and hallway still have the original wood flooring, trim and doors in good repair. The original slate chalkboards hang in each classroom. The building was originally designed to house a blacksmith shop for manual training and agriculture programs, a sound-proof music room for the band, as well as additional classrooms.

The schoolhouse retains its original appearance both interior and exterior. Only one rear exterior wall has been altered from the original sandstone veneer. After the end of World War II, barracks from an air base located in a neighboring town were moved in and used for additional school classrooms. One of these barracks was attached to the west side of the schoolhouse for additional elementary classrooms. When the new Wiley school was erected, these barracks were all moved from the school



property. The west exterior wall of the schoolhouse was simply sealed with a stucco finish rather than replacing the sandstone. As this is the rear wall of the schoolhouse, the changes do little to lessen the overall integrity of the building. Although the flat roof has been repaired and sealed with polyurethane, it is only visible from the rear elevation.

SIGNIFICANCE

The 1938 Wiley Rock Schoolhouse is eligible for the National Register under Criterion A, in the area of Education, for its role as an important school facility in Wiley. The building served as an annex to the adjacent high school and provided space for classes in agriculture, a blacksmith shop for manual training, and a sound-proof music room for the band and orchestra. The building successfully served these purposes and went on to provide other educational opportunities.

The building is significant in the areas of Community Planning and Development and Politics/Government for having been constructed by the Depression-era Works Progress Administration (WPA) as a school district sponsored project. As a relief and public works agency, the WPA completed hundreds of projects across Colorado and the nation to improve local, county and state infrastructure while providing

meaningful work for many of the county's unemployed. Southeast Colorado experienced both the general economic downturn of the 1930s as well as the additional financial and physical damage inflicted by the environmental forces of the Dust Bowl.

The Wiley Rock Schoolhouse is also eligible under Criterion C for its architectural significance. The building typifies the WPA's use of local labor and local materials. The simple building exhibits creative masonry technique and quality craftsmanship. The success of the design and its execution by the WPA is borne out by the building's six decades of successful service.

The dedication of the Wiley community to the education process was demonstrated by the sudden need for additional classrooms when the rural one-room schools were consolidated into the Wiley School District. These rural schools only offered an eighth-grade education. If a student desired to attend high school, they were forced by necessity to room and board in town during the school week. After consolidation with the Wiley district, bus transportation was provided to all the students in the district. Fortunately, this coincided with the need of a WPA project for the area, and building the sandstone schoolhouse became a reality. The dedication of the community is illustrated by the continuing presence of the schoolhouse, a symbol of hope and stability.

The New Building

For the past eight months men have been working on a new building just north of the high school building. The new structure is to be a combined manual training, agriculture, and music building, and it is planned that it will be completed and ready for use by the beginning of the next school year.

The building, a government project, is seventy by seventy feet and is constructed of heavy gray stone, which came from the old Theater and Equity buildings, that the school purchased at the first of the year for that purpose. It is modern in every respect, with many windows to facilitate good light and a wide hall running through from east to west. It is a one story, flatroofed structure with five rooms and is finished in native sandstone veneer with a broad walk of the same material in front of the building from the sidewalk.

It will provide modern, up-to-date manual training and agriculture class rooms and a blacksmith shop for manual training and agriculture students, as well as a sound-proof music room in which the band and orchestra may practice without disturbing students in study hall. They now have to practice in the auditorium.

This building will provide several much needed facilities to the school in giving more room and convenience as well as improving the appearance of the school ground and the town. In addition to the new building and included in the school-government project is a stone curbing which extends the entire length of the school ground on Main Street. Into this curbing are built four loading piers for the school buses. This curbing will do much to help the general appearance and neatness of the school ground.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt created the Works Progress Administration (WPA) on May 6, 1935, as a reaction to the Great Depression. Its purpose was to provide relief work for the unemployed through public works projects. In our area, many of those "unemployed persons" were farmers hit hard by the effect of both the depression and the Dust Bowl days of the dirty-thirties. Between 1935 and 1943 the WP A provided almost 8 million jobs at a cost of 11 billion dollars, and created a legacy of public welfare that has become monumentalized through their still used buildings, roads, dams, schools, indexes, oral histories, and art. The local sandstone schoolhouse is one of those living legacies.

The main focus of the WPA projects was that they made use of locally available materials and local labor. In this project, the masonry for the walls was salvaged from the old Theater and Equity buildings in downtown Wiley. These exterior walls were then covered with the native sandstone slabs, which were abundant in the grasslands along the river. The sandstone for the curb and stairways were dressed stones that were quarried locally. The WPA provided engineering and supervision of the project, and trained the unskilled local labor force. The project also included curbing and gutter for all three main streets in Wiley. The success of this project is demonstrated by the fact that all structures remain functional today.

The sandstone schoolhouse is the only building left of all the original school structures. Through the years it has served as classrooms for all ages of students as needed. Upon completion of the new school complex, the building was used as a senior center and museum under the sponsorship of the local Lions Club. It was once more reclaimed by the school district for use as a pre-school until their new pre-school facility was completed. The school board considered the possibility of demolition until a concerned group of citizens banded together to protect and preserve the heritage of this historic building. It is currently being used for local meetings of 4-H clubs, civic groups, and family gatherings; summer school programs; art exhibitions; and as a practice hall for the Arkansas Valley Wind and Percussion Ensemble. The building is still owned by the Wiley School District, but is leased to Prowers County, which has been a strong support and sponsor of our preservation goal.

Located in southeastern Colorado on U. S. Highway 287, the town of Wiley, incorporated in 1907, has managed not only to survive; it has remained a tiny but stable and vibrant farming community. Built from sandstone quarried locally, the Sandstone Schoolhouse was also built by local Wiley farmers. A number of these original "builders" descendents still live in the community and speak emotionally of how the work on this schoolhouse literally saved their families from the despair of the times. Due to its constant use as a school, there are families who have attended classes in the building spanning five generations.
