Originally, this water course consisted of both ditches and elevated stonemasonry, the latter where it was necessary to span depressions in the topography. This, the only surviving remnant of the Ventura Mission Aqueduct, is a section of viaduct about 100 feet long. Built of rock (cobbles) and mortar, its height diminishes from about 12 feet at the north end (near Canada Larga Road and a stream bed) to ground level at the south end (near the residence located on the next property). Built up in a solid wall from the ground, the width of masonry that actually carried the water conduit on top is just over a yard, but this masonry wall is heavily buttressed at the high The four solid masonry buttresses are built to a height of about 2/3 that of the aqueduct, angling down from their tops for a short distance, descending straight for about a yard, then angling out to the ground. They are about two yards wide at the base and each extends along the aqueduct approximately eight They closely alternate on opposite sides of the structure and are very massive in appearance. The trough at the top which originally carried the water was covered and has collapsed upon itself in this remaining section, but at the high end its design can be seen quite clearly. It apparently was a tiled channel about two feet wide and a foot deep. The entire aqueduct appears to have been stuccoed smoothly, this stucco being particularly well preserved on one or two of the buttresses. It has worn off to show cobbles and mortar on most of the aqueduct itself, and on the ruins grow plants of various kinds, including at one point a huge old cactus. The 100 foot length of the structure is broken by a twelve foot gap about fifteen feet from the high end, where at one time a road went through; this gap is not original. At present the aqueduct is completely surrounded by lemon orchard and, at the low end, a house and garden.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

There is little doubt that these aqueduct ruins constitute the oldest man-made structure in Ventura County. Even the mission, originally older, was almost entirely rebuilt at a later date after its destruction by fire. landmark is a heritage of all three cultures that built our state -- Indian, Spanish, and American pioneer. Fr. Serra assigned Fr. Cambon to supervise the building of the water course, the laborers being local Indians. The system eventually included the filter or settling basin, mission reservoir and three others, the mission fountain, and another fountain with labatory. For more than 70 years the aqueduct was an important part of the development of the Ventura area. The population obtained their water at one or another of the fountains. Women did the family wash there. The water brought by the aqueduct nurtured agricultural enterprises that otherwise could hot have existed, and thus was the very life of the mission.

Originally the aqueduct came from a point on the Ventura River about 1-2 miles north of the remaining ruins, and carried the water to holding tanks behind the San Buenaventura Mission, about 4-5 miles from these ruins (a total distance of 5-7 miles). It is difficult to know the exact distances because we do not know the exact route. Records indicate that some rebuilding occurred in 1794, probably because of an earthquake. The useful life of the aqueduct ended with massive flood damage in the early 1860's (sources disagree as to the exact date).

Since its destruction by floodwaters these ruins have stood, familiar to county pioneers and long-time residents. Freeway construction and land development have obliterated all but the Canada Larga portion of the viaduct. The Ventura County Cultural Heritage Board feels that it should be on the National Register of Historic Places.
