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### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Sargent Town House is a one and one-half story, Arts and Crafts bungalow style, frame house with shingle siding. It is located at the end of Nashua, Montana's main street, one block east of the business district.

The house is set on a concrete foundation and measures 31 by 42 feet, excluding porches. It contains a kitchen, three bedrooms, a living room, dining room and two bathrooms on the first floor, and three bedrooms and a sitting room on the second floor. The present owner, whose family owned the house during the 1940's and 50's, says that glassed-in cabinets separated the living and dining rooms and flanked the fireplace on the west wall of the living room. There was also a window seat under the projecting bay on the east wall. However, these interior Arts and Crafts style furnishings have since been removed. Beamed ceilings are still present in the living and dining rooms.

The gable roof has projecting eaves with exposed rafter ends. Two shed-roof dormers project from the north and south roof slopes. The north dormer has four small casement windows, two with four vertical lights. The south dormer has three small casement windows, two of which also have the distinctive four vertical lights. Four over one sash arrangement is used in the rest of the house's original windows.

An integral porch spans the front of the house. Originally screened, the porch is now enclosed by 1/1 double hung band windows with connecting sills. The center front door on the porch is flanked by two large casement windows with transom lights. There are two double-hung sash windows, also with connecting sills, on the east end of the porch.

Two small rear porches are set on each side of the back of the house, with large screened and glassed windows on the east and south sides and doors on the east sides. Three irregularly spaced double-hung sash windows, two in the four/one style are located between the porches, above the cellar door.

The east end of the house has a narrow, shed-roofed bay marking the dining area on the interior. The one-story bay has six narrow double-hung sash windows, with three vertical lights above and one below. There is also a small double window located between the bay and the south wall. A pair of four/one light windows is placed at the second story level.

The west end of the house is plain, with two irregularly spaced windows on the first floor and matching paired windows at the second story level as on the east end.

Two brick chimneys rise beside and to the east of the south dormer and through the west eave of the north dormer.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

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The Sargent House is significant due to its association with Charles C. Sargent, the first settler of Nashua, Montana and because it represents an important period in the community's development. Sargent had been a scout for General Custer and narrowly missed being with Custer's troops at the Battle of Little Big Horn. A trader and merchant, he was serving as an Indian agent near Poplar, Montana, when the Great Northern Railway was being constructed through eastern Montana. Hearing that there would be a division point at the place which later became Nashua, Sargent moved his family there in 1886 and built the first house on the bank of Porcupine Creek. He started a school, a bank, helped in the formation of School District 13 in Valley County, and established a post office and store in 1888. The simple Arts and Crafts bungalow style house was built by Sargent in 1917, a year before the town was incorporated.

Sargent's original log cabin on Porcupine Creek no longer exists, nor do any of the other early public buildings associated with him. The nominated property is considered to be one of Nashua's first real "homes" and stands as a reminder of Charles C. Sargent and the very influential role he played in the town's founding and early development.
