DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Old North Andover Center Historic District contains seventy structures which represent three centuries of North Andover history. The sparsely settled, largely residential area includes the gracious triangularly shaped town common bordered by Massachusetts Avenue to the north, Andover Street to the south, and Osgood Street to the west. Seven early 19th century Federal style houses line two sides of the common. Other architectural styles represented are Georgian, Greek Revival, Italianate, Mansard, and Carpenter Gothic. The district buildings are interrupted by generous amounts of open land.

Several major town streets converge within the district boundaries. This area was once the center of North Andover's farming community. A later town center lies in the mill district to the north. Remnants of early 19th century commercial activity are found in the district's general store, craft shop and thrift shop. Crowded onto the western side of Stevens Street is a row of late 19th century worker's houses and double cottages built for the employees of the Stevens Woolen Mill.

The two burying grounds located on Academy Road (#1 and #6) contain excellent examples of 18th century stone carving and 19th century monuments in well maintained grounds. Other district memorials are a marker on the site of an early blacksmith shop (#32) and a statue of Phillip Brooks (1835-1893) sculpted by Bella Pratt in 1916 (#33). Brooks was Episcopalian Bishop of Massachusetts and wrote the lyrics to "O Little Town of Bethlehem".

The Kittredge Mansion (#2), 56 Academy Road (NR 1976). The three story Federal style main house was modelled after the Federal town houses of Salem. It was built in 1784 by Dr. Thomas Kittredge. It has tapered Doric corner pilasters, a hip roof with balustrade, and an ell. A working farm for over 200 years, the 45 acres of property include a mid-19th century barn and several other out buildings.

The Carlton-Stevens House (#3), 190 Academy Road, is a three story Mansard sheathed in clapboards with a fish scale slate roof. One of the three chimneys is a tall end chimney with ornamental brick work. The property is separated from the narrow country road by a lovely old stone wall.

The Bailey-Loring House (#4), 84 Academy Road, is a hip roof Georgian structure with four tall inside end chimneys. The simple yet elegant west facade center entrance is flanked by sidelights and headed by a wide entablature. An old barn stands southeast of the house and retains double sliding doors headed by a multi-light window.

Hodgett's Boarding House (#5), 114 Academy Road, is a striking Federal hip roofed structure with 9/6 fenestration, two chimneys and a projecting center entrance with triangular pediment. The five bay wide x two bay deep main house is three stories tall with a ten bay deep 2½ story ell extending from the southern end of the east (rear) elevation. The six center bays of the first story ell are open stalls. Double window shed dormers rise from the ridge roof.

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Old North Andover Center Historic District 7 1

The Captain Nathaniel Stevens House (#7), 140 Academy Road, was built in 1846 by a prosperous mill owner. The imposing Italianate building set back from the road has beautifully maintained landscaping. Tall rusticated posts capped by lanterns frame the driveway. The 2½ story house retains such features as second story balconies with turned balusters, a wide molded building entablature, projecting triangularly pedimented gables, wide molded window cornices, and relief panels depicting various scenes. The Carriage House (7a) extends from the southeastern corner of the east (rear) elevation of the ell. Its striking west facade is dominated by a triangularly pedimented gable with a fanlight in the tympanum. The wide entrance is flanked by round arched windows with keystones. Delicate Doric pilasters give rise to the wide building entablature.

The North Parish Church (#8) dominates the eastern end of the common. The Carpenter Gothic church modelled after the First Parish Church of Cambridge was designed by Richard Bond of Boston and built in 1833. Single Gothic stained glass windows flank the central projecting tower which contains a large Gothic window, a clockface and triple tracery louvered openings in the belfry. Tall pinnacles stand at each corner of the roof and at the four corners of the tower. The tower is crowned by a hexagonal steeple with weathervane.

470 Stevens Street (#16) is a Greek Revival house which has been stripped of its original character by the addition of a hip roofed one story facade porch and asphalt shingle sheathing.

The Moses Foster House (#20), 24 Salem Street, was built circa 1825. The 2½ story ridge roof house has a five bay deep two story ell with an attached flat roofed barn. The projecting center entrance on the west facade is a flat roof open porch supported by posts.

The Dustin Pollard House (#21), 10 Salem Streets, stands at the southern bend of the triangle formed by Johnson Street, Stevens Street, and Great Pond Road. A low picket fence separates the small Cape from the street. The 1½ story ridge roof house has a brick foundation, two chimneys, and low pitched triangularly pedimented dormers. The same low pitched pediment heads the 6/6 windows and center recessed entrance. The door entablature is supported by panelled engaged columns. The building entablature is accented by wide molded corner posts.

The Community Center (#22, 22a), 33 Johnson Street, consists of two clapboarded ridge roof buildings. #22 is two stories with a 1½ story ridge roof projection on the

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east facade. #22a has an intersecting triangularly pedimented gable rising from the center of the south elevation with a triangularly pedimented dormer at the eastern end. Two doors on the elevation are shielded by projecting triangular pediments supported by plain wooden brackets.

8 32-38 Johnson Street (#24 and #23) are two late 19th century double houses. Both are two stories, four bays wide, two bays deep, ridge roofed with two chimneys, and have one story enclosed sheds attached to the northern end of the east (rear) elevations. Both sit on stone foundations, have 6/6 fenestration and double center entrance doors shielded by a hip roofed open porch. #24 is sheathed in shingles with a single band of scalloped shingles linking the first story window lintels. #23 retains decorative brackets supporting the facade entrance porch roof.

8 Cocichewick Lodge (#26), 15 Johnson Street, houses the Order of Masons. The 2½ story hip roof structure is unadorned except for a slight second story overhang and a dentiled cornice. The east facade entrance is framed by lights and shielded by a triangular pediment supported by square columns.

8 18-26 Johnson Street (#27) is a four bay wide 2½ story building facing west. It has an attached shed on the north elevation, and a flat roofed breezeway on the south which connects with a 1½ story building facing north. The entire unit is sheathed in wide clapboards. The facade of the main house has a center entrance flanked by sidelights and pilasters which give rise to the wide frieze and simple, slightly projecting cornice. Two tall chimneys and a skylight stand in the ridge roof of the secondary building.

8 2-12 Johnson Street (#30, 29, 28) is a group of three late 19th century buildings, all 2½ stories, clapboarded, and with ridge roofs. #28 has been slightly altered over the years by the addition of a second story enclosed porch at the southern end of the west facade. This is a glass porch with a hip roof which covers the first story entrance. A two story flat roofed three sided bay projects from the northern end of the facade. #29 has also been slightly changed by the replacement of double 6/6 windows on the first and second story of the northern end of the west facade. The off center entrance is covered by a triangularly pedimented open porch with balustrades to either side of the door. The Hay Scales Exchange (#30) originally housed a butcher shop and grocery. Its scale is similar to that of its two neighbors with the addition of a two story flat roof extension on the north elevation. The west facade of the main structure has an entrance at the northern end, and a multi-light window and a 6/6 to

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its south. This first story section is covered by a hip roof porch supported by four posts. The "Hay Scales Exchange" sign rises from the porch roof. The second story is two 6/6 windows with a single 6/6 in the gable above. The north elevation addition has a multi-light on the facade. The second story is a screened porch with balustrade.

① The Brick Store (#31), 3-7 Johnson Street, was built by a group of investors in 1829 to house a number of shops. The solid 2½ story brick structure rests on a granite foundation. The cedar shingles ridge roof has three asymmetrically placed tall chimneys and a cupola near its southern end. The 11 bay wide x 2 bay deep block has three facade entrances. All are six panel wooden doors reached by four granite steps. There are double windows in the gables. Window lintels and sills are granite.

① 26, 36, and 44 Andover Street (#34, 35, 36) are three imposing Federal style houses situated on the southern border of the common. #36 is the largest of the three similar structures. It is 2½ stories, 5 bays wide x two bays deep, with a ridge roof, two chimneys and two gable dormers. First story windows are 6/6; second story windows are of a smaller scale. An attractive barn stands to the southeast of the house. All three buildings are well spaced and are surrounded by tall shade trees.

① Old Hay Scales Building (#37) is located at the intersection of Andover and Osgood Streets. It was built in 1818 by the proprietors of the Hay Scales in North Andover Parish. The small square clapboard building has a hip roof and center chimney. A small shed with vertical siding extends from one elevation. Fenestration is 9/6. The main door is covered with vertical boards.

① 113-115 Andover Street (#38) is a brick double house built circa 1835 and is a part of the Stevens Coolidge Estate. The 2½ story structure has bridged chimneys. Fenestration is 6/6 with granite lintels and sills. The six bay wide south facade has centered double entrance doors. Both are flanked by sidelights, headed by leaded glass and framed by molded pilasters which give rise to the slightly projecting cornice. A stone wall separates the property from the road.

① The Stevens Coolidge House (#39), 139 Andover Street, is owned by the Massachusetts Trustees of Reservations and includes the early 19th century main house and a considerable amount of open field area and landscaped gardens. The house and the brick double house to its east (#38) are a part of the original Stevens Coolidge Estate. A stone wall runs continuously from #38 to #39. The Stevens Coolidge House is 2½ stories with a ridge roof and four chimneys. A two story addition extends from the east elevation and also has a chimney. The five bay wide by three bay deep main house is ornamented

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by a dentiled cornice. Fenestration is 10/8. The center entrance has double side-lights and is topped by a dentiled triangular pediment supported by slender columns. Three gable dormers rise from the facade roof, each containing an 8/8 window. The center dormer is headed by an open segmentally arched pediment; the other two by triangular pediments. During the early 20th century a serpentine brick wall was built in one of the formal gardens. It was modeled after a wall designed by Thomas Jefferson for the University of Virginia.

The former Tavern on the Boston-Haverhill Road (#40), 13 Chestnut Street, is a lovely Federal style house sheathed in clapboards with a ridge roof and two chimneys. It is five bays wide x three bays deep and 2½ stories tall; fenestration is 9/6. Three stone steps lead to the stone stoop with two benches flanking the projecting enclosed entrance porch. The beautifully landscaped property also includes a small shed with a low pitched roof and paired segmentally arched doors.

169 Andover Street (#41) is an early 19th century two story brick ended structure with two inside end chimneys. The brick ends are stuccoed and the rear (north) roof pitch is extended to form a saltbox. The original house is five bays wide x two bays deep. The rear extension is one bay deep with a 1½ story L-shaped saltbox ell extending from its north elevation. A third addition to the original house is a two story extension on the east elevation. Two quarter round fan ventilators stand in each gable end. The six panel facade entrance door is framed by sidelights and flat pilasters and headed by a molded entablature. A low stone wall and stockade fence separate the property from the street.

15 Wood Lane (#43) is a late Georgian two story farmhouse with center chimney. A one story shed addition extends from the east elevation. The south facade center entrance is shielded by a small hipped hood supported by scrolled brackets with pendants.

Phillips Mansion (#51), 168 Osgood Street, was built in 1752 by Samuel Phillips, a wealthy merchant and co-founder of Phillips Academy. The elegant Georgian mansion has a gambrel roof and center chimney. A two story ell and attached one story barn/shed extend from the west (rear) elevation. A one story flat roof open porch with balustrade projects from the south elevation. The six bay wide east facade is dominated by its fine doorway with fluted pilasters and a triangular pediment.

The Parson Barnard House (#52), 179 Osgood Street, was built in 1715, and was placed in the National Register in 1974. It is the earliest structure in the district. The house served as a manse for three early ministers of the North Parish Church (#8).

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The Barn at 117 Osgood Street (Ma) is a large intersecting ridge roof building which sits behind a stone wall on Osgood Street. The clapboard barn is ornamented by panelled corner pilasters, wide cornice returns, and a molded stringcourse at the second story floor level. The south elevation has a projecting second story gable section braced by four delicate brackets. This section contains a Palladian window flanked by a 9/9 on either side and headed by an elliptical louvered opening with keys at the four compass points.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Old North Andover Center Historic District is significant as the focal point of the town both in terms of its architecture and its historical importance. Despite changes in appearance and function, the area remains an outstanding example of architectural style and of the town's early development. Styles ranging from Georgian (Parson Barnard House) to Federal (Dr. Kittredge Mansion) and late Greek Revival (Captain Nathaniel Stevens House) are represented.

The Old Center, once a crossroad between Boston, Salem and Haverhill, is now primarily residential. Andover was settled in 1646 by residents of Ipswich and Newbury who chose the North Andover Center as the site for their meetinghouse. A concentration of shops, taverns, blacksmiths, stables and stores were found in the area throughout the 18th and 19th centuries. Franklin Academy, the first co-educational school in Massachusetts, stood on Academy Road from 1801-1853.

During the early 19th century a number of small shoe factories were established in the area. They disappeared, however, when the railroad was built too far north to be readily accessible. The 1829 Brick Store (#31) has housed numerous enterprises and is still a commercial building. The Hay Scales Building (#37) retains remnants of its scales which weighed wagon loads of hay. The growth of the Stevens Mill, owned by Captain Nathaniel Stevens, led to the construction of the double cottages and workers' houses on the south end of Stevens Street.

In addition to a succession of meeting houses and homes of well-to-do merchants and craftsmen, the Old Center was the preferred location for homes for the wealthy, as manifested in the Phillips Mansion, Kittredge Mansion, and Captain Nathaniel Stevens House.

The "colonial" common was created in the 1880's by the North Andover Village Improvement Society. Roads were relocated, buildings moved or destroyed, and trees planted. Trade moved to the new business center in town. The Old Center has remained unchanged since the turn of the century.
