DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Fleming House is located on the north side of the Smyrna River in Appoquinimink Hundred, southern New Castle County, Delaware. The property retains its mid-nineteenthcentury setting, with cultivated fields on three sites, and a view of the river from the front. Associated with the house on the nominated property are six frame outbuildings dating from the late-nineteenth and early-twentieth centuries, and relating to the former use of the property as a farm. The boundaries of the property are marked by the edge of the lawn surrounding the house and outbuildings and separating the house lot from the cultivated fields on the west and north sides, a hedgerow and the farm land on the east, and the Smyrna River on the south.

The house itself is a five-bay, single-pile, two-and-a-half story center hall plan frame structure with a two-story frame wing, both sheathed with clapboard. The foundation is stone and brick, with a full basement under the main section. The gable roof of the main section has two interior end chimneys, a box cornice with bed moulding, and dormers on the facade. These Greek revival gable dormers are notable for their ornate pilasters. The facade features symmetrically spaced windows with 1/1 double hung sashes and plain surrounds. The shutters are panelled on the first floor level and louvered on the second. The central entrance has an etched glass door with a four paneled base, and a leaded glass transom. The frame facade porch has trabeated Greek revival posts with recessed panels. Plain porches are located on the west side of the wing and at the rear. There is an open string staircase in the center hall, and the doorways opening off of the hall have glass transoms. Interior details include trabeated door and window surrounds, Greek revival interior doors, and plain Greek revival mantels. The kitchen, located in the wing, features narrow Victorian wainscotting and an enclosed staircase. In general, the structure appears to have been little altered since its construction in the first half of the nineteenth century.

The arrangement of the outbuildings associated with the main structure appears to consist of remnants of a court plan with more modern structures being built closer to the house rather than replacing earlier buildings on or near their sites. These outbuildings are as follows:

<u>GARAGE</u> - late-19th century shed with factory sawn vertical board siding; gable roof with asphalt shingles; cast iron strap hinges.

<u>SHED</u> - early 20th century machine shed with uneven gable roof having exposed rafter ends and covered with corrugated metal; board and batten siding; 4 large entry bays of 2 doors each with very late strap hinges.

SMALL OUTBUILDING - early 20th century shed with large entry bay and smaller door; corrugated tin on gable roof with exposed rafter ends; 1 six-pane casement window.

LONG SHED - late 19th century board and batten barn probably for horses; gable roof with exposed rafter ends and corrugated metal covering; pulley at gable end serving loft door; 2 primary levels with vertical board doors and strap hinges; lst floor doors are divided into upper and lower sections.

<u>SMALL BARN</u> - late Victorian 2-story barn of frame with board and batten siding; gable roof with exposed rafter ends, corrugated metal covering; doors to upper level(s) at gable end;

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section of lower floor of corn crib construction, with narrow vertical boards spaced so as to allow for ventilation. A 20th century frame <u>CHICKEN HOUSE</u> connects this building with the larger barn.

LARGER BARN - also of frame construction, 2 stories in height; gable roof with exposed rafter ends and corrugated metal covering; similar in dimension to #5, but of wide vertical board siding; shed roofed, 1 story addition to rear.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Fleming House is an excellent example of the application of Greek revival architectural features to the standard five-bay, two-and-a-half story, single pile, center hall plan Delaware farm house. The trabeated interior window and door surrounds and porch pillars are characteristic of this style, as is the simplicity of other architectural features.

This property is part of a 200 acre tract occupied at least during the latter part of the eighteenth century as a moderate sized farm. Before its purchase by Joseph Fleming in 1822, the property passed through a series of complicated estate divisions and reconsolidations, in one of which the presence of "buildings on the river" is specified. No visible evidence of this occupation remains, nor have any archaeological traces been The house itself appears to have been constructed by Fleming, a merchant in noted. the nearby town of Smyrna, about 1830, at which time he changed his place of residence from Duck Creek Hundred to Appoquinimink Hundred. The location of the property and the name Flemings Landing suggests that it may have been the center of his mercantile activities. The association of this function with the house appears to have ceased with the death of Fleming's son, Enoch, before 1861, when the estate was sold to cover Enoch's debt's, although the nearby landing continued to be used. In Enoch's estate division, this property is referred to as "Mansion Farm", and it appears to have been operated as a farm into the twentieth century. At present the house is only intermittently occupied, although well-maintained, by out-of-state owners. The unaltered character of the property indicates that the potential exists for archaeological investigation, although no such work has yet been undertaken.
