

# Summary

Located just east of State Hwy. 71 near the center of the King community, the King Schoolhouse is a two-story, brick masonry school building. Its hipped metal roof is capped with a hipped dormer (now boarded-over) and vented by two brick chimneys, one between the eastern window bays on the northern elevation and the other between the western window bays on the southern elevation.

### Elaboration

Located just east of State Hwy. 71 near the center of the King community, the King Schoolhouse is a two-story, brick masonry school building. Its hipped metal roof is capped with a hipped dormer (now boarded-over) and vented by two brick chimneys, one between the eastern window bays on the northern elevation and the other between the western window bays on the southern The principal entrance is on the southern elevation and placed centrally in the wall. The double-leaf entrance is surrounded by a transom and sidelights, and recessed slightly within a large decorative brick arch that is ornamented with a concrete keystone and two concrete springer stones. Otherwise all four facades are symmetrically-fenestrated and virtually without detail. One-over-one wood windows are employed throughout; they are placed individually on the eastern and western elevations and in pairs on the northern and southern elevations. A single-leaf entrance also provides access to the northern or rear elevation and is placed near the center of the wall. The metal roof and brick walls are supported upon a continuous brick foundation.

The interior is remarkably intact. A central hall runs the full length of the building and separates two large classrooms on the first floor, while a single large classroom runs the full length of the floor above. The original pressed tin ceilings and cove ornament survive throughout, as do the original strip floors.

The King Schoolhouse is currently used by the Cossatot Arts Center as their main facility. It is in very good condition.

## Summary

Built in 1915, the King Schoolhouse is associated with the historic context Railroad Era Resources of Southwest Arkansas (Lafayette, Little River, Miller and Sevier Counties), 1870-1945 by virtue of its direct associations with one of the major railroads that played such a crucial role in the growth and development of Sevier County.

### Elaboration

Built in 1915, the King Schoolhouse was built to serve the once-thriving railroad community of King. King was but a settlement in the late 1880s, but became a town after 1897, when the Kansas City-Southern Railroad laid its tracks close by. King became a lumber town, and was in fact named for the King Ryder Lumber Company, which operated a company general store within the town. Formerly scores of houses -- both company- and privately-owned -- surrounded what was the busy business center of a town that boasted of four doctors, a drug store, railroad depot, blacksmith shop, two grocery stores in addition to the King store, two drygoods stores, a livery stable, post office dance hall.

The King Schoolhouse was built primarily as a school building, but also served the surrounding community as a community center and church. Classes were held within this building until the end of World War II, when the town

consolidated its school system with that of Gillham to the north. However, the schoolhouse -- like the entire community of King -- owed its existence to the arrival of the Kansas City-Southern Railroad in the last years of the nineteenth century; as such it is associated with the historic context Railroad Era Resources of Southwest Arkansas (Lafayette, Little River, Miller and Sevier Counties), 1870-1945 by virtue of its direct associations with one of the major railroads that played such a crucial role in the growth and development of Sevier County. It is thus significant under Criterion A as one of the few surviving buildings constructed to serve as a school building for a railroad community during the first decades after its arrival in the county; it is also significant under Criterion C as the only known surviving example of a Colonial Revival school building in Sevier County.
