The area known as the Cascades Park encompasses approximately 35 acres of state-owned property. This historic area, along the southeastern edge of Capitol Center, was, in the 1830's, the scene of rippling streams which wound their way south and west through a wooded ravine, pitched into an immense chasm and eventually entered the base of a hill at which a "bottomless sinkhole" was found. Recently conducted research has indicated that two phenomena existed in this area -- the cascade, itself, which is described as an area of turbulent water; and the waterfall which was seen as a vertical drop of rushing water over a steep hill as it descended into the sink-The cascade was shown on a Tallahassee city map as early Its location has been documented and evidence indicates the land area has undergone some change. The course of the original stream (St. Augustine Branch) has been diverted over the years, and it is presently the drainage ditch which flows south through Franklin Boulevard, curves around the front of the Haydon Burns Building, and continues in a southwesterly direction behind Centennial Field, a ball park.

The area today is identified with a clutter of unsightly municipal service buildings, dilapidated structures, the old Leon County Jail, a ball park and the Prime Meridian base parallel monument which rests in obscurity next to the unkept weed-covered ditch.

Included in the Cascades Park area is the Prime Meridian Marker, a concrete monument which established the point of beginning for all land surveys in the State of Florida. This fenced-in marker is surrounded by a quarter acre plot, and is an integral part of this historically significant area.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Cascades Park, encompassing the historic Prime Meridian Marker, is the site of a land area once replete with natural features and foliage, and a beautiful cascade formed by "a pleasant mill-stream" which wound along the eastern border of Tallahassee.

In 1824, the land was so enchanting that the two commissioners selected this area for the location of the capital of the Territory of Florida. Commissioners John Lee Williams and William H. Simmons were so enthralled with the natural beauty of the rolling hills, the numerous springs, and natural landscape that they chose the area as the seat of government. Geographic and economic factors were of importance in their mission, but little doubt exists that the cascade and surrounding land area influenced their selection.

The Prime Meridian Marker, which is included in this site, is historically significant as the point of beginning for all land surveys in the State of Florida. The marker, in 1824, was said to have been a lightwood stake, surrounded by four blazed trees. Later in 1853, placement of a permanent stone marker was authorized; but it was not until 1892 that a permanent stone marker was erected. The present monument was authorized in 1925 with an inscription stating that it had been placed over the original marker. However, there does exist some question regarding the precise location since present marker represents the third such structure.

The significance of the entire land area is unquestioned. Selection of the site as the territorial capital by the commissioners, the establishment of the Prime Meridian Marker in 1824 within the area, and the cascade/waterfall as a regional attraction all contribute to the importance of this site in Florida history.
