Presently undergoing a complete restoration, Cedar Haven plantation, also known as the Houston Alexander place, is located approximately three miles south of Faunsdale on Marengo County Road 61, east of state highway 25. Constructed circa 1850, the plantation complex rests on a cedar covered rise set back the road. The main house is a significant example of Greek Revival architecture while the two contributing outbuildings are good representations of vernacular agricultural structures.

The main house is a frame, two story rectangular block with a side gable roof and two interior brick chimneys. The house was constructed using mortise and tenon construction. The roof material is asphalt shingles. Dominating the front facade is a full height pedimented portico supported by four tall Doric columns. The portico spans three of the five bays of the facade. In an arrangement unique among Canebrake plantation houses, the main house at Cedar Haven features three front entrances, a central double leaf entrance with transom flanked by single leaf entrances with transoms. The three entrances on the first floor of the facade reinforce the theory that porches were often used as outdoor living areas. The unusual number of entrance doors allowed easy egress to the front portico. Windows on the facade of the house have a 9/9 pane configuration while the remainder, those on the side and rear, are 6/9 pane configuration. The upper floor of the front facade features a central double leaf entrance with transom which opens onto a partial width balcony. The side elevations are identical with two upper bays and four lower bays. The two interior bays of the first floor are single leaf entrances with transoms. A shed roof porch is positioned in front of the two doors. The shed porch on the northern elevation had been enclosed as a bath room but the addition has recently been removed and the porch appears as it did upon construction. The rear facade features an original shed roofed extension with end rooms connected by an open porch. A later shed roof carport with concrete posts has been attached to the rear.

The main house features a common floorplan, a central hall with flanking double rooms. Each room features simple wooden mantles with subtle Greek Revival detailing. The central hall contains a straight run staircase which rises along the left wall. The rear entrance of the central hall features double folding doors and a full width transom. The interior of the house has been covered in particle board. Access to the rear rooms at the opposite ends of the rear extension is from the porch. The rear porch features decorative lattice work screens.

Located immediately behind the main house are two contributing outbuildings, a storehouse and a smokehouse. A plantation office building, located immediately to the south of the main house, was destroyed. The storehouse is a simple rectangular building with a gable roof. The smokehouse is a square building with a pyramidal roof and a shed addition.

Cedar Haven retains much of its integrity in regard to design, construction, material, and retains a high degree of integrity in regard to feeling, location, setting, and sense of place. The main house is a significant example of a Greek Revival plantation dwelling while the outbuildings are good examples of vernacular plantation outbuildings. The Cedar Haven plantation complex contains three contributing buildings.

Significance Statement

Criterion C: Architecture

Cedar Haven plantation is significant under National Register Criterion C as a good example of a Canebrake plantation complex. Constructed around 1850, the main house of the plantation is a significant example of a Greek Revival plantation house while the two remaining outbuildings are good examples of plantation outbuildings. The complex retains a high degree of integrity in regard to craftsmanship, materials, and design, as well as conveying a sense of time and place.

Historical Summary

In 1816, Philip Weaver moved to the Mississippi Territory as an agent for a Baltimore mercantile firm which was conducting a profitable trade with the Indians. Weaver became a prosperous planter and owned considerable lands in present day Bibb, Perry, Dallas, and Marengo counties as well as a number of mercantile establishments in Selma. Weaver was a member of a team of United States surveyors who were exploring and charting the lands of the interior of Alabama, including the area known as the Canebrake. While the land was considered fertile, the survey team was concerned about the apparent lack of water in the region during the long, dry summer months. According to John Witherspoon Dubose, Philip Weaver happened upon a cabin in the Canebrake at which the inhabitants caught rainwater in large barrels. Weaver then realized that the answer to the problem of water shortage was through the creation of elaborate cistern systems. Weaver then began to purchase large tracts of land in and around Uniontown, Alabama. Indeed, Weaver, from Uniontown, Maryland, suggested the name of his hometown to replace the name of the community of Woodville.

Philip Weaver's principal residence was in Selma and therefore, Cedar Haven was strictly used as a plantation house, occupied by the Weaver family upon residence at the plantation. Construction of the main house began around 1850. Weaver died in Selma after receiving a blow to the head from the stock of a carbine rifle wielded by Federal troops. After Philip Weaver's death, the plantation passed to his two brothers but was soon purchased by the Alexander family. The Alexanders retained possession of Cedar Haven until the 1980s when it was purchased by Courtney Judd. In 1991, Joseph Gandy purchased a tract of land comprising 319 acres of the original Cedar Haven plantation. Mr. Gandy has undertaken the restoration of Cedar Haven plantation. 1

Archeological potential

Although no formal archeological survey has been made at the Cedar Haven plantation, the potential for subsurface remains may be high. Properties of this type were sited within a constellation of dependencies such as kitchens and other outbuildings. Buried portions may contain significant information that may be useful in interpreting the entire property.




